Something must be done, and that quickly, to limit the terrific speed of automobiles traveling through the residence section of Carmel on San Carlos avenue.

The fact that all of the children attending the public school are obliged to cross this highway several times a day is in itself sufficient reason for establishing several hard and fast regulations governing this traffic.

It has been suggested that "Slow Down" and "Blow Your Horn" signs be erected one block each side of the school grounds, and that drivers who fail to comply with these regulations be reported to the local constable or by telephone to the constable at Monterey. This may be done by obtaining the license number.

It has also been suggested that a mounted traffic officer be stationed near the school, at the expense of the county.

"Tusitala" An Artistic Triumph

Lloyd Osborn Among Those in Attendance

Hail "Teller of Tales!"
Hail Robert Louis Stevenson!

Hail Herbert Heron and John Northern Hilliard!

The presentation of "Tusitala" at the Forest Theatre by the Western Drama Society on Friday evening was as different from the Del Monte performance a week before as night from day. We must confess that last week's review published in this journal was printed as a news affair concerning the doings of our townspeople, without much enthusiasm. But this article, this tribute, is given with high regard and pleasant satisfaction with a work wonderfully done. It was a work of joy and reverence, and not only the authors, but every one who helped to make the affair the artistic success it was, are entitled to the highest commendation.

It has been often said that Forest Theater audiences are cold. Not so at this performance. The players were accorded generous applause throughout, and they deserved it. Not a single bit of poor portrayal of character was in evidence. And this may be accounted for to a considerable degree by the reverence of every player for Stevenson, and by the splendid training of the producers.

John Northern Hilliard did some versatile acting, and was always the character represented—the rollicking pirate, then again the mountebank, and again the resourceful Attwater. Herbert Heron did three difficult parts with convincing effectiveness. D. L.

James, president of the Kansas City Symphony Association was the Piper. John Gribner was a splendid Long John Silver. Walter Butler O'Connell as Dick Shelton, Professor Frances E. Lloyd as Father Damien, Talbert Joselyn as Blind Pew, Alice MacDougal as Alicia, Marion Boke as Jim Hawkins, Antonio Corsi, the artists' model, as Dirk, Professor S. S. Seward as Dr. Livesey, William Cooper as Black Dog and as Case the Trader, Filoi Afiamalu, native Samoan, as Uma, and scores of others—effective players, picturesque peasants and archers, dancing nymphs, charming children—too numerous to mention—where else could one see so remarkable a cast?

Scenically the producers left nothing to be desired. The dancing of Marion Devendorf, Rutherford Scott and Filoi Afiamalu, with original music by Frederick Preston Search was a distinct contribution.

And from the front of the house, as if to add to the realism of the affair, came a direct and intimate voice of the past. Lloyd Osborn sat there drinking in the beauty of it all, and both he and his wife told me afterwards, behind the scenes, that they would not have missed it for anything.

The policy of the Western Drama Society to present each year an original work by California authors, has again proved its inestimable value, and should there by nothing adequate submitted next year, "Tusitala" might well be repeated.

Unless all signs fail, "Charlie's Aunt," at the Forest Theatre, next Saturday night, will bring tears and aches to a big laughing audience.

The comedy is so impelling that the rehearsals are frequently delayed while the actors give vent to their mirth.

The amusing antics of Lord Fancourt Babberly, masquerading as an old lady, in order to chaperon a couple of his college chums and their sweethearts, is irresistible.

When two college gentlemen lose their hearts to the supposed aunt and become rivals for her affections, one uproarious scene succeeds another. To add to the complications the real aunt appears unexpectedly, accompanied by Lord Fancourt's sweetheart. He is torn between two desires—one to be a real old lady "with trousers on" and the other to be a real man with a skirt on when in the neighborhood of the girl. The unraveling of the tangle is highly amusing.

Arthur Cyril, who plays the leading role, is an actor of rare comedy ability. The others of the cast have proven their worth in farce comedy in the early rehearsals.

There will be a few reserved seats for the performance, the remainder open to general admission.

Improving a Good Thing.

The postoffice department has just approved a new invention which, postoffice authorities say, may revolutionize the parcel post service, at least so far as shipments "from farm to table" are concerned. It is likewise expected to have an influence in eliminating the middle man.

While the receipts from the parcel post have been enormous, yet department statistics reveal that farmers have not taken the advantage of it that they should. The new device, if accepted by American farmers, is expected to more than double parcel post receipts in country districts. To plan has been approved by put this into immediate use, a which the fourth class postmasters will take charge of the distribution of the new device.

The invention, to which the committee on experiment, research and design of the postoffice department has given its formal approval, is nothing more or less than a container by which country produce of all kinds can be shipped any distance without danger of breaking or spoiling. The container is made of the same fiber as that used in the construction of railroad car wheels. It is a cylindrical box with a peculiar inner arrangement of fiber partitions in which even eggs can be placed and the package thrown around as ordinary baggage without danger of breaking.

Where's the Gain?

A remarkable movement is being conducted throughout the country for a readjustment of postal rates and the inauguration of a One-Cent rate for letters, a reform which would result in a saving to letter users throughout the United States of over \$75,000,000 each year, and reducing the government revenue just that amount.
