

TARY FOR YEAR ENDING AUGUST 7, 1916

To the Board of Trustees and Members of the Carmel Library Association :

Twelve regular meetings have been held during the year. A change of Librarians took place on October 1, 1915, Mrs. Sydney Yard succeeding Miss Stella L. Vincent. The services of an assistant became necessary during the summer, and Miss Janet Prentiss began work June 1, 1916. 383 books have been added and 294 cardhalders. Articles III and VII of the Con-

stitution were amended and supplementary rules for the guidance of the Librarian were passed.

Circulation is 8875, the largest in the history of Carmel Library.

The method of registry has been brought up to date. New shelves for librarian's use, and new table and chairs for children have been secured. Electric lights have been insialled.

The publication of a quarterly list of accessions has been undertaken.

The Library has been cleaned and rearranged, thuse securing considerable extra shelf room.


The Board secured the services of a collector and has found the result satisfying.

During the rainy season the Library was open on Sunday afternoons for readers.

The work has gone on with the utmost smoothness, and the affairs of the Library have never been in more prosperous condition, nor has its usefulness to the community ever been greater than now.
