An event unique in the history of library development was celebrated recently all over this State. The event referred to is County Free Library Sign Day. A sign, recently adopted by the county free libraries of the State, is displayed at practically every branch of every one of the thirty-six counties that have put into operation the county free library plan.

So silently do the forces of education advance, and so quietly is each link in the chain of progress forged, that results are accepted as a matter of fact, and the golden event is here—unheralded.

With this another step in the progress of library service in California is taken. From a modest start in 1908, when the work was begun, with the expenditure of about fifteen hundred dollars that year, county free library service has grown to include thirty six counties, supplying over eighteen hundred branches; has accumulated nearly half a million volumes, and its income for this year is over \$400,000.

The adoption of a uniform sign, to be displayed at every branch at which county free library service may be obtained, is a unifying step in the work, and calls especial attention to the main aims of the project—equal, economical and complete library service for everyone wherever he may happen to make his home.

The rapid growth of the work indicates that in a few years every county in California will have such a library service. It is as complete as possible, since the county service is supplemented by the State library at Sacramento, and through it, by access to large libraries elsewhere.

The people of Monterey county, Carmel included, have been enjoying the county free library privileges since September, 1913, when the library was established by the Board of Supervisors. There are now forty branches in the county. Twenty-one schools have also affiliated and are receiving a service many times more efficient than what their own library funds would permit.

Guard Against Fire in the Forest

Matches

Be sure your match is out before throwing it on the ground. Break it in two.

Tobacco

Throw pipe ashes and cigarette and cigar stumps in the dust of the road, and stamp out the fire. Do not throw them into needles, leaves or brush.

Making Camp

Make a small camp fire. Build it in the open -- not against a tree or log or near brush. Scrape away anything burnable near it.

Leaving Camp

Never leave a camp fire alone, even for a brief time, without pouring water upon it and then covering it with earth. See 1914 hunting license.

Bonfires

Do not make bonfires when it is windy, or when or where there is the least danger of getting beyond control. Avoid making a larger fire than necessary.

Fighting Fire

If you discover a fire, endeavor to put it out. If you cannot, get word of it to the nearest federal or state fire warden quickly.

Information

Keep in touch with the rangers. Ascertain the number of the district in which you are camping from United States forest rangers, county clerks or newspaper offices. Make a note of it on a card or memorandum book.

"All for the Sake of California"

The state board of education has published an interesting booklet of seventy pages on "California, the Story of Our State." It is intended as a text book in the fifth and sixth grades of the elementary schools and will be bound in as a supplement to the new Introductory History by Mace, which has just been rewritten for California schools. Though written for a child's mind the supplement will make interesting reading for adults. The book was written by P. V. Valentine, instructor in history and civics in the San Francisco normal school, and edited by Will C. Wood, commissioner of secondary schools in co-operation with members of the state board of education; Wood and Valentine have consulted the sources, including California newspapers of early days, in their efforts to insure accuracy of historical material.

The story of Spanish California and the missions is told in an interesting manner. The chapter dealing with the discovery of gold and the rush of the Argonauts carries much of the air of romance and daring of those times. It also deals with recent civic reforms and gives much prominence to the development of our state.

The illustrations have been carefully selected. Among the most interesting are a scene at Mission Dolores, San Francisco, showing the huts occupied by the Indians, a rodeo at San Gabriel Mission, San Francisco in 1849, Los Angeles in 1857, and the parent navel orange tree, still growing at Riverside.

The state board of education believes that California history is deserving of greater recognition in the schools.

Incorporation

The idea that the proponents of the proposed Carmel incorporation plan mean to put the matter through regardless of opposition or of justice should not be entertained for a moment. The matter is one for the whole community to decide and it will be so decided.

And another thing which the Pine Cone wants to make plain and emphatic is the statement that there is and will be no "slate" of candidates for election as officials should the proposition carry. At the proper time a public meeting will be held to nominate candidates, and all these candidates will come before all the voters.

Brilliant Young Inventor

John Hays Hammond, Jr., for the purchase of whose invention of a wireless torpedo controlling device both the House and the Senate of the United States have agreed to spend \$750,000, is a resident of Gloucester, Mass., where most of his experiments in connection with this invention have been carried on. With the payment of this sum he will turn over to the government exclusive rights in patents and secrets for which he might have secured a much larger sum from other nations. Mr. Hammond is a graduate of the Sheffield scientific school of Yale University, an institution for which his father, John Hays Hammond, the his father, John Hays Hammond, the expert mining engineer and multi-millionaire, has done much in the way of benefactions. In addition to this wireless torpedo control device, Mr. Hammond is the originator of a system of aeroplane patrol of the national boundaries; and he has devised many more effective methods of dealing with incendiary projectiles, which have been approved by the United States army ordnance department. He served as one of the delegates from the United States to the radio-telegraph convention held in London in 1912.

PETITION FOR INCORPORATION OF CARMEL-BY-THE-SEA

NOTICE is hereby given that the following petition shall be presented to the Board of Supervisors of the County of Monterey, State of California, at a regular meeting of said board, to be held on the Fifth day of September, 1916, at Two o'clock P. M. of said day, to-wit:

CARMEL, CAL., Aug. 2, 1916

To The Honorable Board of Supervisors

Of the County of Monterey, State of California:—

We, the undersigned, qualified electors of the County of Monterey, State of California, and residents within the hereinafter described portion of said County, hereby petition your Honorable Body that the following described portion of Monterey County be incorporated as a Municipal Corporation, under the Provisions of Act 2348 of the General Laws of the State of California, entitled "An Act to provide for the organization, incorporation, and Government of Municipal Corporations." The portion of the County hereby asked to be incorporated under the provision of said Act is described as follows:—All that portion of the County of Monterey which is included within a line beginning at a point at the South-easterly corner of Addition Number Five to the Town of Carmel-by-the-Sea, running thence westerly along the southern boundary line of said Addition Number Five to the westerly side of Junipero Avenue, thence westerly along the southerly side of Twelfth Avenue to the easterly side of Mission Street; thence southerly along said easterly side of Mission Street four hundred fifty feet, more or less, to the intersection of the County Road; thence southerly along the easterly side of said County Road to a point intersected by the southerly side of Santa Lucia Avenue, projected; thence westerly along said southerly side of Santa Lucia Avenue, to the Pacific Ocean; thence northerly along the line of the shore of said Pacific Ocean to the dividing line between the lands of F. H. Powers and the Pescadero Rancho; thence easterly along the southerly boundary line of the Pescadero Rancho to the westerly side of Lincoln Street; thence northerly along the westerly side of Lincoln Street to the northerly side of First Avenue; thence easterly along said northerly side of First Avenue to the westerly side of Dolores Street; thence northerly along said westerly side of Dolores Street to the northerly side of Vista Avenue; thence easterly along said northerly side of Vista Avenue to the westerly side of San Carlos Street; thence northerly along said westerly side of San Carlos Street to the northerly side of Alta Avenue; thence easterly along said northerly side of Alta Avenue to the easterly side of Junipero Avenue; thence southerly along said easterly side of Junipero Avenue to a point of intersection with the said southerly line of Pescadero Rancho; thence easterly along said southerly line of Pescadero Rancho, about fifty feet more or less, to the easterly side of Junipero Avenue; thence southerly along said easterly side of Junipero Avenue to the northerly line of the subdivision of old Carmel City; thence easterly along said northerly line of Carmel City to the easterly line of Carmel City; thence southerly along a portion of the easterly line of old Carmel City and the easterly side of the subdivision of Paradise Park and a portion of the easterly line of the subdivision of Addition Number Five to the Town of Carmel-by-the-Sea to the place of beginning.
