## Guard Against Fire in the Forest

## Matches

Be sure your mateh is out before throwing it ou the ground. Break it in two.

## Tobacco

Throw pipe ashes and cigarette and eigar stumps in the dust of the road, and stamp ont the fire. Do not throw them into needles, leaves or brush.

## Making Camp

Make a small caup fire. Build it in the opeu - not againet a tree or $\log$ or near brush. Scrape away anything burnable near it.

## Leaving Camp

Never leave a camp fire alone, even for a brief time, without pouring water upon it and then covering to with earth. See 1914 bunting liceuse.

## Bonfires

Do not make bonfires when it is windy, or when or where there is the least danger of getting beyond control. Avoid making a larger fire than necessary.

## Fighting Fire

If you discover a fire, eudeavor to put it out. If jon cannot, get word of it to the nearnst federal or state fire warden quickly.

## Information

Keep in touch with the rangers. Ascertain the number of the district in which you are eamping from United States forest raryers, county clerks or newspaper offices. Maka a note of it ou a card or memorandum trook.
