Walter Warren, recently arrived from Alaska, was present.

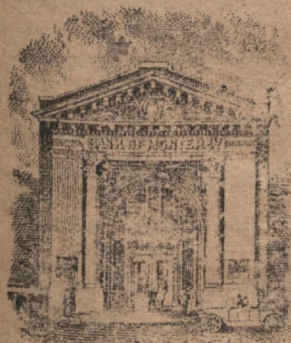
Games and refreshments helped to round out a pleasant and profitable evening.

Duty Calls—Do Your Carmel's School of the Part—Mass Meeting Drama Opens

Every adult resident of this town should make an effort to attend and take part in the public meeting at Carmel Hall on next Friday evening.

The success of the admirable Carmel incorporation plan depends upon the selection of efficient public servants, and it is the responsibility of the voters of Carmel that men and women of ability be placed in nomination.

Following incorporation one of the first matters of important action should be that of street improvement. Let us plan a City Beautiful, and build as our funds permit to perfect it. Every tree that stands between the curbs should be protected and made a part of the scheme of winding roads and beautiful street vistas. Save the trees everywhere, but particularly in the streets.

There has been some speculation as to what would become of the septic tank and the sewer line beyond Santa Lucia street under incorporation. It is argued that much of the sewer would be outside the city limits and not subject to city control. It is a fact that in many cities the sewer outlet and part of the system is outside the city limits.

The adjustment is simple. A deed to the property on which is located the septic tank and to the right of way may be secured by the city at any time, should it be deemed advisable to make the drainage district and the city one and the same.

The Carmel Development Co., owner of the property, has already dedicated it, but should a deed be necessary, it stands ready to give one. It is merely a matter of legal formalities, and no citizen should be deterred from voting in favor of incorporation because of it.

In recognition of present needs and with a vision for the future, the Carmel School of Dramatic Art has been organized and a studio opened in the residence of Mrs. Sydney Yard, Lincoln and Seventh Avenues.

The work of the school, as its names implies, will be to give instruction in all phases of dramatic art. Illustrated talks, readings and lectures will be given regularly at the studio and through them it is planned to inform and entertain the residents of Carmel with the newest in dramatic literature, stage craft and music.

A limited number of boarders can be accommodated in the school, and for them special outdoor work and recreation will be provided.

The Department of Expression is in charge of Mrs. Sydney Yard, a graduate of the National School of Philadelphia. Mrs. Yard has been instructor in the San Jose Normal School and in the College of the Pacific and in the California School of Oratory, having organized the latter institution and served as its principal for several years. The course of instruction gives thoroughly training in the technique of expression, embracing both voice and action; there will be drills for training the ear in discrimination of tone, correct breathing and modulation, with examples for developing the voice in relation to volume, resonance, smoothness, color and intensity. Gymnastic drills for muscular development and strength, relaxing exercises (as taught by Francis Del Sarte) will also be given. There will be original story telling by word and by pantomime, character sketches from life and fiction, both written and oral, and the present action of thought and emotion by the interpretive word method. The Department of Dramatic Literature and Stage-craft will be in charge of Miss Helen Parkes, B. S. Lake Erie College, Painesville, Ohio, and for years teacher in the Laurel School, Cleveland, Ohio.

The course will consist of the study of the development of the drama, modern plays and modern stage-craft. There will be a series of illustrated talks on stage setting and lighting and the Little Theater movement. The pupils of the school will produce one act plays on their own stage to illustrate modern stage methods.

charge of the music in the school and will give lessons in singing, breath control and tone production for adults, and chorus work for children, with special attention to sight reading, ear training and correct breathing. Miss Gray has just returned from a year spent in Illinois College Conservatory of Music, where she studied with Mrs. Genevieve Clarke Wilson, concert soloist, and a pupil of Gottschalk, George Henschel and Fraulein Campen. Miss Gray previously studied with Mrs. Hillman Smith of San Jose, a pupil of William Shakespeare. She will also give lessons in History of Music and a series of talks on current musical events.

It has been generally agreed that Carmel is an ideal place for a private school of this character, and it is hoped that the Carmel School of Dramatic Art is the nucleus of a strong and permanent institution.

Election Proclamation

AN ORDER PROVIDING FOR the organization and incorporation of a certain described district of country, in the county of Monterey, State of California, as a municipal corporation, under an Act of the Legislature of the State of California, entitled "An act to provide for the organization, incorporation and government of municipal corporations," approved March 13, 1883, and the amendments thereto; to provide for a name therefor, establish the boundaries thereof, and call an election within said territory to determine whether the same shall be so organized, and to provide for an election of the elective officers of said proposed corporation.

WHEREAS, at a regular meeting of the Board of Supervisors of the County of Monterey, State of California, held on the 5th day of September, 1916, at its regular meeting room, in the Court House, in Salinas City, County of Monterey, State of California, there was presented to said Board a petition praying for the incorporation of the following described district of country in said County of Monterey, State of California, to-wit:

All that portion of the County of Monterey which is included within a line beginning at a point at the Southeast corner of Addition Number Five to the Town of Carmel-by-the-Sea, running thence westerly along the southern boundary line of said Addition Number Five to the westerly side of Junipero Avenue; thence westerly along the southerly side of Twelfth Avenue to the easterly side of Mission Street; thence southerly along said easterly side of Mission Street four hundred fifty feet, more or less, to the intersection of the County Road; thence southerly along the easterly side of said County Road to a point intersected by the southerly side of Santa Lucia Avenue, projected; thence westerly along said southerly side of Santa Lucia Avenue to the Pacific Ocean; thence northerly along the line of the shore of said Pacific Ocean to the dividing line between the lands of F. H. Powers and the Pescadero Rancho; thence easterly along the southerly boundary line of the Pescadero Rancho to the westerly side of Lincoln Street; thence northerly along the westerly side of Lincoln Street to the northerly side of First Avenue; thence easterly along said northerly side of First Avenue to the westerly side of Dolores Street; thence northerly along said westerly side of Dolores Street to the northerly side of Vista Avenue; thence easterly along said northerly side of Vista Avenue to the westerly side of San Carlos Street; thence northerly along said westerly side of San Carlos Street to the northerly side of Alta Avenue; thence easterly along said northerly side of Alta Avenue to the easterly side of Junipero Avenue; thence southerly along said easterly side of Junipero Avenue to a point of intersection with the said southerly line of Pescadero Rancho; thence easterly along said southerly line of Pescadero Rancho, about fifty feet more or less to the easterly side of Junipero Avenue; thence southerly along said easterly side of Junipero Avenue to the northerly line of the subdivision of old Carmel City; thence easterly along said northerly line of Carmel City to the easterly line of Carmel City; thence southerly along a portion of the easterly line of old Carmel City and the easterly side of the subdivision of Paradise Park and a portion of the easterly line of the subdivision of Addition Number Five of the Town of Carmel-by-the-Sea to the place of beginning; as a municipal corporation of the class to which the same might belong under an act of the Legislature of the State of California, entitled "An Act to provide for the organization, incorporation and government of municipal

corporations" approved March 13th, 1883, and the amendments thereto, which petition was accompanied by an affidavit of three of the qualified electors of said Monterey County, residing within the limits of the territory described in said petition, that all of said persons who have signed said petition are qualified electors of the County of Monterey, State of California, and reside within the limits of said proposed municipal corporation, there being more than fifty signatures to said petition;

AND WHEREAS, on said 5th day of September, 1916, there was presented to said Board proof to its satisfaction of the publication of said petition, together with notice that the same would be presented at a meeting of said Board on the 5th day of September, 1916, which said publication was made for more than two consecutive weeks prior to and immediately preceding said presentation in the Carmel Pine Cone, a weekly newspaper of general circulation, printed and published within the boundaries of said proposed municipal corporation; and due proof having been presented to this Board showing that there is a resident population of more than five hundred (500) and less than thirty-five hundred (3500), to-wit: a resident population of five hundred and twenty-four (524) persons within the limits of the territory described in said petition.

WHEREUPON, said Board, after hearing said petition and the evidence adduced, finds and determines as facts the following:

1. That no part of the territory within the boundaries described in said petition is incorporated under any law or laws as a municipal corporation.

2. That said territory contains a resident population of more than five hundred (500) and less than thirty-five hundred (3500), to-wit: a resident population of five hundred twenty-four (524) persons.

3. That said petition was signed by fifty or more residents and qualified electors within the County of Monterey, State of California, and residents and qualified electors within the boundaries of the territory described in said petition.

4. That said petition, together with a notice of the time and place when the same would be presented to this Board, was published for two successive weeks prior to and immediately preceding the time when the same was presented in the Carmel Pine Cone, a weekly newspaper of general circulation, printed and published within the boundaries of said proposed municipal corporation.

5. That said petition was, at the time and place stated in said notice, presented to this Board.

WHEREFORE, it is now ordered by the Board that the boundaries of the corporation in said petition prayed to be organized as a municipal corporation, under an act of the Legislature of the State of California, entitled "An act to provide for the organization, incorporation and government of municipal corporations," approved March 13th, 1883, and the amendments thereto, are established and defined to be the same described in said petition, to-wit:

All that portion of the County of Monterey which is included within a line beginning at a point at the Southeast corner of Addition Number Five to the Town of Carmel-by-the-Sea, running thence westerly along the southern boundary line of said Addition Number Five to the westerly side of Junipero Avenue; thence westerly along the southerly side of Twelfth Avenue to the easterly side of Mission Street; thence southerly along said easterly side of Mission Street four hundred fifty feet, more or less, to the intersection of the County Road; thence southerly along the easterly side of said County Road

to a point intersected by the southerly side of Santa Lucia Avenue, projected; thence westerly along said southerly side of Santa Lucia Avenue, to the Pacific Ocean; thence northerly along the line of the shore of said Pacific Ocean to the dividing line between the lands of F. H. Powers and the Pescadero Rancho; thence easterly along the southerly boundary line of the Pescadero Rancho to the westerly side of Lincoln Street; thence northerly along the westerly side of Lincoln Street to the northerly side of First Avenue; thence easterly along said northerly side of First Avenue to the westerly side of Dolores Street; thence northerly along said westerly side of Dolores Street to the northerly side of Vista Avenue; thence easterly along said northerly side of Vista Avenue to the westerly side of San Carlos Street; thence northerly along said westerly side of San Carlos Street to the northerly side of Alta Avenue; thence easterly along said northerly side of Alta Avenue to the easterly side of Junipero Avenue; thence southerly along said easterly side of Junipero Avenue to a point of intersection with the said southerly line of Pescadero Rancho; thence easterly along said southerly line of Pescadero Rancho about fifty feet more or less, to the easterly side of Junipero Avenue; thence southerly along said easterly side of Junipero Avenue to the northerly line of the subdivision of old Carmel City; thence easterly along said northerly line of Carmel City to the easterly line of Carmel City; thence southerly along a portion of the easterly line of old Carmel City and the easterly side of the subdivision of Paradise Park and a portion of the easterly line of the subdivision of Addition Number Five of the Town of Carmel-by-the-Sea to the place of beginning.

That when so organized said corporation shall be known by the name of "The City of Carmel-by-the-Sea."

That an election be held, and is hereby called to be held, within the limits described in said petition, and as herein fixed for such proposed corporation, on the 26th day of October, 1916, for the purpose of determining whether the same shall become incorporated as a city of the sixth class, under an act of the Legislature of the State of California, entitled "An act to provide for the organization, incorporation and government of municipal corporation" approved March 13th, 1883, and the amendments thereto.

That at said election the voters shall cast their votes "For incorporation" or "Against incorporation" and said voters shall also at said election cast their ballots for the names of persons to fill the various elective municipal offices prescribed by law for municipal corporations of the sixth class, to-wit: That at said election the following named officers for said corporation shall be voted for:—Five Trustees, to constitute a Board of Trustees; a Clerk, and a Treasurer.

That said election shall be conducted in accordance with the general election laws of the State of California.

That said election shall be held in the building known as S. J. Wyatt's store.

That the following named electors and residents within the limits of the proposed corporation shall be the officers of said election, to-wit: Inspector: I. B. Waterbury. Judges: John Williams, Emaline Harrington. Clerks: Helen Parkes, C. O. Gould, W. N. Dingle.

The Clerk of this Board shall, by publication in the Carmel Pine Cone, a weekly newspaper of general circulation, printed and published within the boundaries of said proposed municipal corporation, give notice of the time and place of holding said

election, as required by law.

The foregoing order was passed by the following vote:
