## Incorporation?

The exelamation, "Improve our streets !" is jolted out of us after we leave the highway on our road home. If the machine gets stallerl a block away from the house, we are apt to add, "The fellow who wont improve his street ought to go to jail,"
We tried laard to improve our street but no one would help us. That again suggests a use for a constable and a justice of the peace and a jail-but after all, what we need now is something simpler than ineorporation: the hearty cooperation of our citizens. Suppose we do save a lot of money that goes to the county for roads, and win the right to repair our share of the county road ourselves, and to maintain two salaried officers in Carmel? Then, when we mention streets, the treasurer stanting before an emptr cash box will remind us that a year must vass before a city tas can be levied. Bouds can be issued. It is a il fair and above-board, and every one can vote who has the right. We are already committed to the expense of iucorporation and we find that it is too late to draw the lina at more expense. Some towns are so poor, although incorporited, that their allotted space of highway is still unbuilt. But we have our highway, and the county is obliged to keep it in repair, unless we incorporate.
We do not mention the proposed boundary line for the Uity of Car-mel-hy-the Sea; we have been informed that there is "a good and sufficient reason, which we are not at liverty to divulge," for believing that the city should not be bomuled on the south by the Carmel iver.
We want better streets and we want gond sewerage more than we want a city treasurer or a city clerk. If the idea of cooperation conld take root, even at this late hour, it might save us the needless expenditure of much effort, tin:e and money. Some of us stand ready to help with substantial subscrip. tions for better streets. Few of us want another sewer such as we have, but we want good drainage. Wedon't allride in automobiles. Some are paying for their homes, some have mortgages to meet. Most of us have a sense of relief when the taxes hre paid.
Cooperation or incorporation? It is up to the voters. The census has nothing to do with it now be cause the census included children under 21 years of age, and some kindly folk who do not own prop erty in Carmel, but who desire to see Carmel improve at any cost.
Carmel will never have a better list of nomiuess from which to choose trustees than uow. Do we want it now !
