

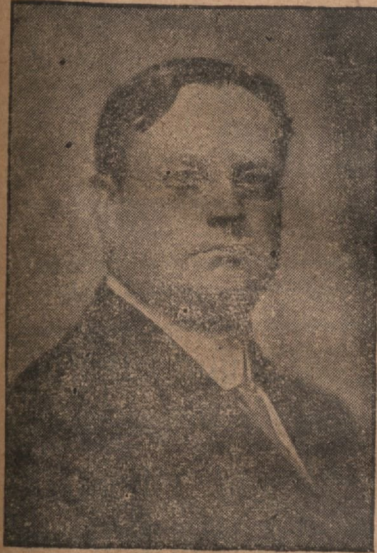

#### Hughes Has Lead in Carmel Vote

#### Observation and Comments on a Trip Through Southern California Counties

Readers of the Pine Cone will be interested in the following interview with Miss Eunice T. Gray, who returned to Carmel last week, after a long and interesting automobile trip which took her and party into Mexico.

"A 2000 mile drive through California in harvest time should be a cure for financial depression and pessimism. The acres of yellow grain fields, stacks of fragrant alfalfa, the grazing stock, grapes, purple and gold; raisins, carloads of them; melons, corn; in the San Joaquin Valley oil derricks and tanks, railroad and highway construction camps, new towns and baby carriages; all through the lower counties oranges, walnuts, lemons, olives, beans and roses.

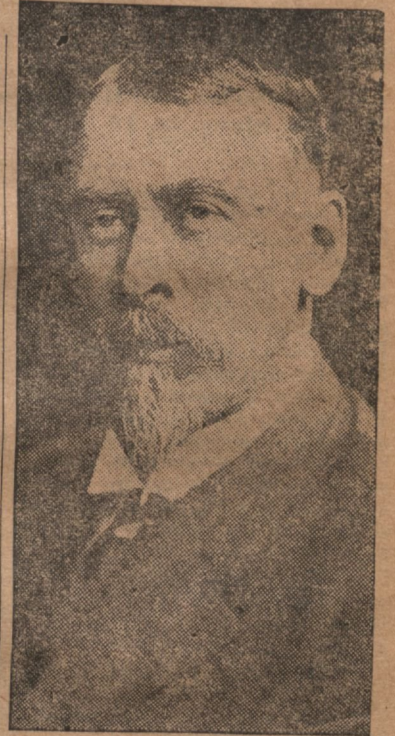
"Opulence, plenty, all the way down to San Diego bay, where the luxuriant kelp fields are cut and harvested and converted into potato. And yet, in the good old-fashioned way, the people were grumbling about hard times, riding in automobiles and paying fifty cents to witness the latest lavish, garish movie, "Intolerance," for which they received a magnificent thrill, a mass of unsound philosophy and a bunch of cleverly written 'wet' literature folded in with the programs.

"We crossed the line into Mexico and returned to the exquisite little garden Exposition, with a great sense of our blessings. Our last day in San Diego was seasoned with a speech from Governor Johnson and a visit with two intelligent ex-residents of Mexico. Each knew Villa personally, had had intimate experience of many years with the native Mexican and their leaders,

one a profound student of art, archaeology, history and science, the other connected with the mining interests of an American corporation. Their understanding and opinion of the Mexican situation were diametrically opposed; both were worth listening to, and both said they could and would talk to us all night if they thought they might persuade us to vote for their presidential candidate.

"In Los Angeles I had a delightful visit with Miss Brooks and Mrs. Van Horn, who are charmingly situated and very well and happy in their right environment, both busy in music and drama. They sent affectionate greeting to their Carmel friends.

It is scarcely fair to compare well-groomed, sweet scented luxuriant Pasadena with sodden, besmirched and greasy Bakersfield. One advertised "Dry," the other flaunted twenty-foot signs, "Vote No on Both Amendments." Conclusions based on such extremes in outward conditions are not always sound, but we had a better opportunity to form political opinions in the stress of Los Angeles life, which more and more shows contrasts between wealth and poverty, efficiency and failure, humanitarianism and greed; and particularly between thoughtful progress and a wooden headed conformity, and worse yet, an absolute failure of the many to think at all.

## We Might Try It Here

The surtax on vacant lands in Alberta and Sackatchewan provinces, Canada, is working so satisfactory that there is talk of adopting it in Manitoba. It has been found that this form of taxation not only increases the public revenue, but moves landholders, absentees, and others, to do something with their real estate in order to make it productive.

Thus, the landholder who, under the system which enabled him to draw unearned increment from vacant land because of his neighbor's industry and enterprise, and to hold "for a rise," finds it necessary, under the land surtax system, either to improve the property himself or sell it to those who will improve it.—Christian Science Monitor.

## Official Boundaries of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea

All that portion of the County of Monterey which is included within a line beginning at a point at the South-easterly corner of Addition Number Five to the Town of Carmel-by-the-Sea, running thence westerly along the southern boundary line of said Addition Number Five to the westerly side of Junipero Avenue, thence westerly along the southerly side of Twelfth Avenue to the easterly side of Mission Street; thence southerly along said easterly side of Mission Street four hundred fifty feet, more or less, to the intersection of the County Road; thence southerly along the easterly side of said County Road to a point intersected by the southerly side of Santa Lucia Avenue, projected; thence westerly along said southerly side of Santa Lucia Avenue, to the Pacific Ocean; thence northerly along the line of the shore of said Pacific Ocean to the dividing line between the lands of F. H. Powers and the Pescadero Rancho; thence easterly along the southerly boundary line of the Pescadero Rancho to the westerly side of Lincoln Street; thence northerly along the westerly side of Lincoln Street to the northerly side of First Avenue; thence easterly along said northerly side of First Avenue to the westerly side of Dolores Street; thence northerly along said westerly side of Dolores Street to the northerly side of Vista Avenue; thence easterly along said northerly side of Vista Avenue to the westerly side of San Carlos Street; thence northerly along said westerly side of San Carlos Street to the northerly side of Alta Avenue; thence easterly along said northerly side of Alta Avenue to the easterly side of Junipero Avenue; thence southerly along said easterly side of Junipero Avenue to a point of intersection with the said southerly line of Pescadero Rancho; thence easterly along said southerly line of Pescadero Rancho, about fifty feet more or less, to the easterly side of Junipero Avenue; thence southerly along said easterly side of Junipero Avenue to the northerly line of Carmel City; thence easterly along said northerly line of Carmel City to the easterly line of Carmel City; thence southerly along a portion of the easterly line of old Carmel City and the easterly side of the subdivision of Paradise Park and a portion of the easterly line of the subdivision of Addition Number Five of the Town of Carmel-by-the-Sea to the place of beginning.

## ORDINANCE NO. 1

AN ORDINANCE for fixing the time and place for holding meetings and establishing the procedure for calling special meetings of Board of Trustees.

The Board of Trustees of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea, Monterey County, State of California, do ordain as follows:

Sec 1. The Board of Trustees of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea, Monterey County, State of California, shall hold regular meetings on the first Tuesday of each month, at the hour of 7:30 p. m. of said day.

Sec. 2. Regular meetings may be adjourned to a date specified in the order of adjournment, and when so adjourned such adjourned meeting shall be a regular meeting for all purposes.

Sec. 3. Special meetings of said board may be held at any other time upon at least three hours notice by the President or the City Clerk, or by any three members of the Board; such notice to be in writing and signed by the persons calling such meeting. Recital in the minutes of said Board of the fact of giving such notice, upon being approved at a subsequent meeting of said Board, shall be conclusive evidence that such notice was duly given and such meeting duly called and held.

Sec. 4. The place for all meetings of said Board in the City of Carmel by the Sea is hereby fixed at such place as may be indicated by a conspicuous sign reading: "City of Carmel-by-the-Sea, Board of Trustees, Regular meeting date first Tuesday of each month." In event of change of meeting place or change of date of regular meeting, the above sign to be displayed for not less than one week at new place of meeting, or one week before change of date with new date inscribed thereon, also notice inserted in local paper of such changes.

PROVIDED, That any regular or special meeting, when once so assembled, may adjourn to continue its deliberations in any other place in the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea, the time and place of holding such adjourned meeting to be specified in the motion to adjourn, and the recital of such motion in the minutes of said Board, upon being approved at a subsequent meeting thereof, shall be conclusive evidence that such adjourned meeting was duly and regularly called, noticed and held.

The initial meeting of the City Trustees of Carmel-by-the-Sea was held on Monday afternoon, at the office of J. W. Hand.

All the members were present, and Clerk Nichols and Treasurer Slevin. Trusree A. P. Fraser was unanimously elected President of the Board.

The first ordinance passed by the Board (printed in another column) was one designating the time and place of meetings of the Board.
