More Suggestions For Our City Trustees

Never a day passes now that some person or persons do not come into the Pine Cone office to offer one or several suggestions for the consideration of our city trustees.

With an empty treasury, as at present, it is not apparent just how some of these propositions are to be carried out.

Nevertheless it will do no harm to present here some of the matters our citizens have in mind:

"Purchase the Forest Theatre property, and make the affair a municipal enterprise."

"Stop auto speeding on San Carlos avenue, at least during school hours."

"Order sidewalks laid and houses numbered, that carrier delivery of mail may be inaugurated."

"Build a new bath-house, and provide hot salt water baths."

"Appoint 'Dad' Hamilton City Marshal."

Figures From Carmel Voting Precinct

The largest vote ever polled in Carmel at any election was cast last Tuesday. Of 403 names on the great register 292 citizens voted. The surprise of the count was the showing made by the Socialists. Benson, candidate for President, received 81 votes here, or nearly thirty per cent of all the votes cast here for President. Mills for Senator, received more votes than Patton, and Governor Johnson had as many as both together. Rigdon, who has been elected State Senator, ran behind Boyce in this precinct.

In most of the precincts on Monterey Peninsula the count was completed at about 3 a. m., but Carmel's efficient election board, which had more votes to count than most of the others, had final figures before 1 o'clock.

The Pine Cone's announcement of Hughes' election was based upon telegraphic advices received at 6 o'clock Wednesday morning. Many journals made a similar announcement.

Will This Provoke a Controversy?

According to the discovery recently made by Herbert I. Priestly, Curator of the Bancroft Library of the University of California, credit for planning the settlement of Upper California by the Spaniards is due, not to Junipero Serra, hero of the missions, but to visitor-general Jose de Galvez.

In a volume just published, Priestly, who has done very extensive research work in manuscripts of early California history, gives credit for planning the missions to Galves, and the honor for building them to Father Serra. He says:

"Galves found that the military management by Gaspar de Portola's soldiers had caused the Lower California missions to suffer, and he restored management of their affairs to Father Junipero Serra. When Galves proposed the establishment of Missions in Upper California, the College of San Fernando, which had charge of the California missions, was bitterly opposed to the plan of establishing so many new missions and at such remote distances, but Father Serra was an enthusiastic supporter of the plan Galvez proposed."

The work of research in California history has been promoted by the Native Sons, who have annually appropriated \$3000 to the State University for the maintenance of scholarships.

zen. This popular operatic and
concert tenor has a princely income
from his voice and its "records."
He is a native of Athlone, Ireland,
and was educated in County Sligo.
His training for his calling was
obtained in Milan.

McCormack's first fame was won
in concert work in Dublin. In
1907 came his debut as an opera
singer in London. A year later he
sang in the United States with the
Metropolitan Opera company,
since which time he has been gather-
ing a large following of concert
goers who admire the lyric quality
of his voice and the sentiment of
songs. They find in him a true
exponent of the art of Ireland.

ORDINANCE NO. 1

AN ORDINANCE for fixing the time and place for holding meetings and establishing the procedure for calling special meetings of Board of Trustees.

The Board of Trustees of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea, Monterey County, State of California, do ordain as follows:

Sec. 1. The Board of Trustees of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea, Monterey County, State of California, shall hold regular meetings on the first Tuesday of each month, at the hour of 7:30 p. m. of said day.

Sec. 2. Regular meetings may be adjourned to a date specified in the order of adjournment, and when so adjourned such adjourned meeting shall be a regular meeting for all purposes.

Sec. 3. Special meetings of said board may be held at any other time upon at least three hours notice by the President or the City Clerk, or by any three members of the Board; such notice to be in writing and signed by the persons calling such meeting. Recital in the minutes of said Board of the fact of giving such notice, upon being approved at a subsequent meeting of said Board, shall be conclusive evidence that such notice was duly given and such meeting duly called and held.

Sec. 4. The place for all meetings of said Board in the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea is hereby fixed at such place as may be indicated by a conspicuous sign reading: "City of Carmel-by-the-Sea, Board of Trustees, Regular meeting date first Tuesday of each month." In event of change of meeting place or change of date of regular meeting, the above sign to be displayed for not less than one week at new place of meeting, or one week before change of date with new date inscribed thereon, also notice inserted in local paper of such changes.

PROVIDED, That any regular or special meeting, when once so assembled, may adjourn to continue its deliberations in any other place in the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea, the time and place of holding such adjourned meeting to be specified in the motion to adjourn, and the recital of such motion in the minutes of said Board, upon being approved at a subsequent meeting thereof, shall be conclusive evidence that such adjourned meeting was duly and regularly called, noticed and held.

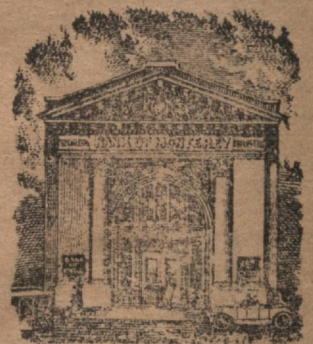
