ORDINANCE NO. 1

A^N ORDINANCE for fixing the time and place for holding meetings and establishing the procedure for calling special meetings

of Board of Trustees. The Board of Trustees of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea, Monte-rey County, State of California, do ordain as follows:

SEC. 1. The Board of Trustees of the City of Carmel-by the Sea, Monterey County, State of Cali fornia, shall hold regular meetings on the first Tuesday of each month, at the hour of 7:30 p. m. of said day

SEC. 2. Regular meetings may be adjourned to a date specified in the order of adjournment, and when so adjourned such adjourned meeting shall be a regular meeting for all purposes.

SEC. 3. Special meetings of said board may be held at any other time upon at least three hours nothereafter, at 6 o'clock P. M., and that unless paid prior thereto, five per cent will be added to thy calling such meeting. Recital in the minutes of said Board of the fact of giving such notice, upon lact of giving such notice, upon being approved at a subsequent meeting of said 1 card, shall be conclusive evidence that such notice was duly given and such meeting duly called and held. SEC. 4. The place for all meet-ings of said Board in the City of Carmel-by the Sea is hereby fixed at such place as may be indicated

at such place as may be indicated by a conspicuous sign reading: "City of Carmel-by the Sea, Board of Trustees, Regular meeting date first Tuesday of each month."
