Much Beloved and Respected Woman Passes Away

Last Saturday night, at 9:30, the long and useful life of Mrs. Elizabeth Martin, pioneer Carmel resident, came to a close.

The end came quite unexpectedly. As was her usual custom, she had served her invalid son's supper, and shortly after was relating to a friend incidents of a San Jose visit, from which she had returned the evening before. Suddenly she complained of feeling ill, and despite all efforts to revive her, she passed away.

The funeral took place on Monday morning from the old family home, near the historic Carmel Mission. A large concourse of friends accompanied the remains to the Protestant cemetery at Monterey. The officiating clergyman was Rev. H. A. Fisk of the Monterey Presbyterian church.

Mrs. Martin was a native Carnock, Lanarkshire, Scotland, and was seventy-six years of age. In 1863, during the Civil war, she arrived in Canada with her husband, Mr. Stewart. They came to Monterey county in 1871, being among the early settlers of Carmel Valley. Mrs. Martin was one of the first white women in that section, and her life there covered a period during which conditions of a primitive nature prevailed.

Carmel Valley was continuously her home during the remainder of her life, and she was active in all affairs making for its development and growth.

John Martin, deceased's second husband, died in 1893.

Mrs. Martin reared, and reared well, a large family. She was a woman of high ideals and ambitions for her children, each of whom is a prominent and respected citizen.

Deceased is survived by three children by her first marriage—John Stewart, Joseph H. Stewart and Andrew Stewart, all of Carmel. The other children are James A. and Robt. H. Martin of Neponset; William E. and Roy Martin of Carmel Valley; Mrs. Robert G. Leidig of Carmel-by-the-Sea; and Carmel Martin, prominent lawyer of Monterey.

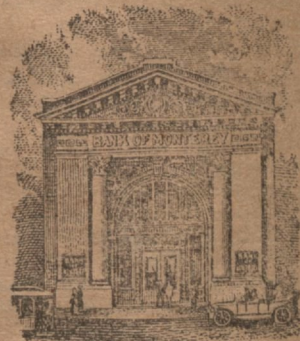

ORDINANCE NO. 1

AN ORDINANCE for fixing the time and place for holding meetings and establishing the procedure for calling special meetings of Board of Trustees.

The Board of Trustees of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea, Monterey County, State of California, do ordain as follows:

SEC. 1. The Board of Trustees of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea, Monterey County, State of California, shall hold regular meetings on the first Tuesday of each month, at the hour of 7:30 p. m. of said day.

SEC. 2. Regular meetings may be adjourned to a date specified in the order of adjournment, and when so adjourned such adjourned meeting shall be a regular meeting for all purposes.

SEC. 3. Special meetings of said board may be held at any other time upon at least three hours notice by the President or the City Clerk, or by any three members of the Board; such notice to be in writing and signed by the persons calling such meeting. Recital in the minutes of said Board of the fact of giving such notice, upon being approved at a subsequent meeting of said Board, shall be conclusive evidence that such notice was duly given and such meeting duly called and held.

SEC. 4. The place for all meetings of said Board in the City of

Carmel-by-the-Sea is hereby fixed at such place as may be indicated by a conspicuous sign reading: "City of Carmel-by-the-Sea, Board of Trustees, Regular meeting date first Tuesday of each month." In event of change of meeting place or change of date of regular meeting, the above sign to be displayed for not less than one week before change of date with new date inscribed thereon, also notice inserted in local paper of such changes.

PROVIDED, That any regular or special meeting, when once so assembled, may adjourn to continue its deliberations in any other place in the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea, the time and place of holding such adjourned meeting to be specified in the motion to adjourn, and the recital of such motion in the minutes of said Board, upon being approved at a subsequent meeting thereof, shall be conclusive evidence that such adjourned meeting was duly and regularly called, noticed and held.
