Woman's Place in History.

There is no warrant in history or anywhere else for the assumption that woman's voice means enfeeblement. The feeblest natoins in the world happen to be those where women have the least to say. From the world's beginning woman has done her share of the building and fighting. She has stood side by side with man against everything. Man has fought the resounding wars, but hers have been the silent wars that test even more the courage, endurance and capacity. In every war she has been an element of sanity and self-control.

The enfranchisement of woman does not depend on her attitude toward any particular candidate or issue. It will hardly be imperiled in this country because she may not vote to suit this or that organ. Still less will it be made to hinge on hectic visions of danger from highly organized nations. It is based on certain principles of justice and democracy that are slowly but surely marching forward to success.

Wages and Living Cost.

In any discussion of the high cost of living, the census statistics for California, given out recently, should be taken into account. They show, among other things, an annual wage increase from \$644 in 1905 to \$757 in 1914, or somewhat less than 17 per cent. This advance is healthy enough, but it is not phenomenal, and probably it leaves the wage earner slightly worse off, in actual purchasing power, than he was in 1905. As is known to every housewife of ten years' standing, the cost of living has advanced far more than 17 per cent in the past decade. According to the United States bureau of labor statistics the increase in food prices alone between 1907 and 1914 was, for the whole United States, almost 25 the national wealth,


Origin of Names

The names of Kings county and Queens county, which date back to colonial times, are evidently modications of the possessive form of the titles of the rulers under whose sway the forms of government were introduced into their oversea pos-sessions. The name of West Riding of Yorkshire was given to the Long, or Nassau, island of the Dutch, after the colony on the Hudson was named New York for the Duke of York.

Like Kings Highway, which was the road of the King, so the county of the King became Kings County. And now Queens Boulevard takes its name from Queens county, in which one of the village settle ments has the name of Queens. In the state of Washington is a King county, bearing the name of Paci-fic coast senator, Preston King.-Brooklyn Standard Union.

We print below, extracts from a letter received by a local resident from a soldier correspondent "somewhere in France." We learn that, after all, war is not all that Sherman said it was.

"I am not actually in the trenches at the moment and am enjoying the bit of a rest very much indeed.

"Whenever we get the chance, everything possible is done to give the men a bit of enjoyment in the way of football, concerts, etc. My company was giving a concert the other night and really the performance was not at all bad, and the audience was almost as amusing as the singers were. It was a tremendous stroke of luck that the little village in which we were billeted possessed a piano, without which, of course, it is much more difficult to arrange these things.

"There is a great deal of keenness displayed about the football games, and at present we are engaged in a contest for a cup presented by a divisional general. My battalion won the cup last winter, and are in a fair way to repeat the success this season.

"We are getting pretty cold and wet weather now and are not looking forward with very much pleasure to another winter in the trenches, though I am quite sure the "Boche" must be dreading it more than are we. He is constantly making up his mind that the weather has brought our advance to a standstill, only to have his calculations rudely upset by a new "push."

"One sign of the winter being upon us is the periodical issue of rum to the troops, and serving out is sometimes one of the most amusing things one has to do. There are very strict regulations regarding this issue, which always has to be done by an officer. When in billets it is often issued just about "lights out," when the men have turned in for the night and you find them all rolled up in their blankets. The men nearly all sleep in pairs or sometimes sets of three, for greater warmth, and you usually find these pairs most devoted chums. There is always a joke or a bit of chaff going about at this time and men will often challenge one another to say "Thank you, sir" directly after swollowing this "tot," a feat of some difficulty except for a very seasoned drinker, as the stuff is rather strong and takes the breath of most fellows away for a second or two. Having had their their "tot," they curl up in their blankets, and, amid a chorus of "Good night, sirs," you go stumb-ling off through the mud and leave them to a good night's rest. It is like putting a large family of children to bed, and really I get tremendously fond of the fellows.

"I am afraid I cannot think of any particular interesting incidents to relate. I have had no thrilling adventures myself beyond occasional Continued on Page Four


