In the absence of J. E. Nichols, Trustee Peter Taylor acted as clerk.

Many communications were read, among the matters being written about were property affairs, official grade, pipe laying, ordinances, etc.

The City Attorney was requested to prepare various new ordinances.

Legislature Likely To Pass Road Project

Colonel E. A. Preble, who is about to resume his residence on the Monterey peninsula, is an enthusiastic worker for the Coast Scenic Road. He is making effective use of his extensive acquaintance among influential men and strong organizations to promote the interest of this much-desired highway from Carmel-by-the-Sea to San Simeon, an appropriation of \$350,000 for which is provided in a bill introduced in the Legislature by Senator E. S. Rigdon.

The Colonel has interested a number of members of the Legislature in the proposition, and has succeeded in obtaining the support of several powerful organizations.

Reports from other sources indicate that the Legislature will vote favorably on this much-desired public improvement, and the Governor-to-be, Stephens, is a "good roads and more roads" man.

All Should Honor the Birthday of Lincoln

Next Monday, February 12, we honor the name of the preserver of the nation, for on this day, 108 years ago, President Lincoln was born at the humble Rock Springs farm in Hardin county, Kentucky. The story of that self-built, self-directed career is familiar to every native-born citizen and to a large proportion of foreigners, for Lincoln's influence is for all times and for all peoples of the world; he is one of the handful of men who have lived for humanity as a whole. And yet he had no special opportunities for elevating himself to this position, only those which come to the most humble man and woman. He had less than one year's schooling and only a half-dozen books to read in his boyhood, yet the thoroughness with which he availed himself of these small blessings laid the foundations for that thoroughness and efficiency which was the keynote of his whole life.

Among the outstanding qualities of the man none was more significant than his physical strength, fearlessness of utterance, scrupulous honesty, and wonderful sincerity. These were the qualities which built up one of the greatest figures of human interest.

Abraham's father, Thomas Lincoln, was a carpenter; it was, however, through his mother, Nancy Hanks, that his fine qualities came. He married Mary Todd in 1842, at Springfield, Illinois, was nominated President for the first time in May, 1860, signed the famous proclamation of emancipation in January, 1863, began his second term as President in March, 1865, and brought the war to a close in the same year. He was assassinated in Ford's Theater, at Washington, on April 14, 1865.

ORIGIN OF A LINCOLN PHRASE.

In a big New York church recently the pastor, people, and a group of veterans, observed the fifty-third recurrence of the date of Lincoln's address at Gettysburg, says the New York World. In coincidence with the anniversary occasion, attention is called to the origin of the phrase in that address concerning "government of the people, by the people, for the people." Dr. Frank H. Vizetelly, a scholar of extensive research among literary monuments of the past, has discovered this form of words in Wycliffe's preface to the translation of the Bible which he published somewhere between the years 1380 and 1384. "The Bible," wrote the doctor, "is for the government of the people, by the people, and for the people." Lincoln may or may not have heard of this passage. It makes little difference save as a matter of curiosity. The Wycliffe utterance has had to be dug out of antiquity to reach the popular eye. The phrase spoken at Gettysburg in 1863 rang with the note of a living hour. It has continued to ring ever since, and it will carry the living word so long as words endure. The phrase belongs to the man who gave it immortality.

Red Cross Chapter Gets Instructions

Washington, D. C., Feb. 4.—Mrs. Mabel Slevin, Secretary Carmel-by-the-Sea Red Cross Chapter:

In view of present events and possible developments, central committee desires each chapter immediately to make adequate preparation to carry out the work for which the Red Cross is chartered by Congress.

Call meeting of executive committee at once, make tentative arrangements, capable of quick completion, for roomy, centrally located headquarters, rent free, and equipment for same, if not already provided.

Appoint following committees: Finance, Hospital, Garments and Surgical Supplies, Comfort Bags, Shipping, Publicity and Information, Motor Service. Appoint committee on cooperation with outside organizations, which should begin work at once. File names and addresses of all volunteers, assigning them as far as possible in above committees. If not already done, appoint committee on Education.

For information concerning courses of instruction for lay women inquire of Bureau of Nursing Service, Washington; for graduate nurses, the same bureau. Doctors volunteering should be referred to Washington; men wishing to volunteer should take first aid courses, and the possibility of organizing sanitary training detachments should be taken up at once.

Present to the public the vital importance of large supporting chapter membership and appoint special committee to conduct aggressive membership enrollment. Detailed instructions will be sent as needs develop.

The Central Committee asks prompt acknowledgement by letter or telegram of these instructions, giving outline of your preparations. Call freely on headquarters for full cooperation, since the Central Committee realizing the opportunity of service to the country, bespeak every effort for complete and thorough organization for possible needs.
