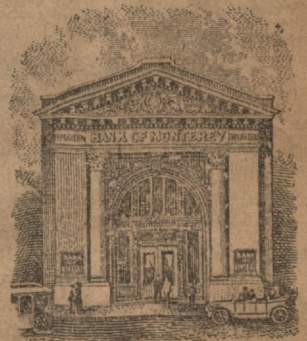
Who'll Write the Music?

BRYAN AND BOOZE.

Although William J. Bryan's political ambitions have encountered repeated failures, the country that thrice refused him the presidency nevertheless reposes profound confidence in his sincerity. The people have faith in the man Bryan, even though they withhold confidence from Bryan the partisan. He has imprinted himself indelibly on the national consciousness as a preacher of moralities who believes in his own preachings and practices them to the fullest possible extent. Therefore it is that his declaration that he proposes to devote the remainder of his life to the advocacy of fundamental moralities rather than to practical politics is received sympathetically. Mr. Bryan has come to regard prohibition as the chief moral issue before this country. He believes that the welfare and happiness of this people are dependent upon the abolition of the liquor traffic. Dedicating his life and service to this cause, Mr. Bryan assuredly will advance immeasurably the emancipation of the Republic from liquor.

PATRIOTS FOR PAY.

The proposal that by paying our soldiers \$30 a month a sufficient number will be attracted into the Army to make up the desired number of fighting men should not be given serious consideration. The mercenary soldier is never to be depended on, and he has brought disaster on every country that has employed him. Boundaries of the Proposed Game Refuge

A description of the boundaries in the proposed game refuge in the Santa Lucia mountains, as provided for in a bill introduced at Sacramento by Assemblyman Martin is printed below. Mr. Martin, in a recent letter to the American, disclaims responsibility for the bill, having introduced it at the request of the Game Protective Association, and he does not favor the bill particularly, believing that the proposed game refuge embraces too much territory.

It would be well for Carmel sportsmen to look into the matter, and communicate their views to Assemblyman Martin.

If this bill goes through, it will close a large tract of land to hunters which would otherwise be open to anyone, as most of the land is in the government forest reserve.

If this game refuge bill was passed, it would chiefly benefit private holdings which border that territory, and give the sportsman who has plenty of money all the best of it, as is usual in these cases.

The boundaries of the refuge are as follows:

Beginning at a point on the Arroyo Seco in Township 19 S., R. 5 E., where the ridge on the west of Santa Lucia creek meets the Arroyo Seco; thence up the summit of the ridge west of Santa Lucia creek to Santa Lucia mountain; thence westerly along the summit of the ridge separating the watersheds of San Antonio creek and the Arroyo Seco to the summit of the Coast Range; thence northwesterly along the summit of the Coast Range to the divide separating the Big Sur drainage area and the Arroyo Seco; thence along said ridge to the divide separating the Carmel watershed from the Arroyo Seco watershed; thence easterly along the summit of said divide to the divide separating the Arroyo Seco from Piney creek; thence along the summit of said divide to the Arroyo Seco; thence easterly along the Arroyo Seco to the point of beginning.

Forest Supervisor H. G. Merrill appeared before the Board stating the needs of the trail builders in the Monterey National Forest, and \$500 was appropriated. There are twenty-five men at work building trails, and while there are funds to pay salaries, there is no money for supplies and transportation. The Forest Service is doing fine work in building trails through the Monterey National Forest, and the county will be amply repaid for its appropriation in this work.

ORDINANCE NO. 6

AN ORDINANCE TO PROHIBIT CERTAIN DOMESTIC ANIMALS FROM RUNNING AT LARGE WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF CARMEL-BY-THE-SEA, PROVIDING FOR THE IMPOUNDING OF SUCH ANIMALS, AND PROVIDING FOR A POUNDMASTER AND THE BURIAL OF DEAD ANIMALS.

THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE CITY OF CARMEL-BY-THE-SEA DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any horse, mare, colt, ass, jack, mule, ox, bull, steer, cow, calf, goat or hog to be or run at large or to be pastured, herded, staked or tied, for the purpose of grazing, in or on any public street, alley, park or public place in the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea, and it shall be unlawful for any of said animals to be tied, staked, pastured or be or run at large on any property belonging to any private individual within the corporate limits of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea without the consent of the owner or the occupant of such property first had and obtained, or to be so staked or pastured within fifty (50) feet of the residence of another without the consent of such occupant first having been had and obtained.

Section 2. It is hereby declared to be the duty of the Poundmaster to take up and safely keep in a pound to be provided by the Board of Trustees of said City any animal mentioned in the first section of this Ordinance that may be found at large in or upon any public street, alley, park or other public place, or in and upon any property belonging to any private individual within the corporate limits of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea contrary to the provisions of Section one of this Ordinance, but he shall not take up any animal that is in the immediate charge of any person who is driving it in, through or from the City.

Section 3. The Poundmaster shall collect the following fees, charges, costs and expenses, which he shall receive in lawful money from the owner or other person or persons redeeming any animal so impounded under the provisions of this ordinance, or from the proceeds of the sale thereof, to wit:

1. For every horse, mare, colt, ass, jack, mule, ox, bull, steer, cow, or calf impounded by him the sum of \$3.00, and \$1.00 additional for every day such animal is necessarily held by him.

2. For every other animal impounded by him the sum of \$2.00 and 50c additional for every day such animal is necessarily held by him.

3. For advertising each notice of sale of any such animal, that is, for posting notice of sale of such animal, \$1.00, together with the cost of publication.

4. For selling (including certificate of sale) any such animal a commission of 15 per cent on the gross proceeds of the sale.

Section 4. Any impounded animal may at any time before a sale thereof be redeemed and taken away upon payment of such fees and charges as may have already accrued.

Section 5. When any animal is impounded the Poundmaster shall at once notify the owner thereof, if known to him, and he shall post a notice in three public places in the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea containing a description of said animal and brands thereof, if any, and setting forth that unless said animal is redeemed before the time of sale fixed in the notice, which shall be not less than seven days from the date of the posting of said notice, it will be sold at public auction to the highest bidder at the time and place to be provided in such notice to pay the charges which have and shall accrue against it, with costs, and if no redemption be made, the poundmaster shall sell such animal or animals at the time stated.

Every such sale shall be made for cash in United States Gold or Silver Coin and shall take place at some place in the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea to be designated by the Poundmaster between the hours of ten (10:00) A. M. and two (2:00) P. M., on any day not more than ten days from the first posting of the notices, provided that the Poundmaster may postpone any such sale for one day by verbal notice given at the time and place of sale, and thereafter from day to day not exceeding five days in all, when there are no bidders present, or for any cause that he may believe the animal or animals will not bring a reasonable price.

Upon receiving the purchase money the Poundmaster shall deliver to the purchaser the animal sold with a bill-of-sale thereof, signed by himself as Poundmaster, and shall pay the money so received to the Treasurer of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea.

Section 6. If any animal impounded by the poundmaster is sick and disabled or in such condition as to be unfit for further use, said animal shall be destroyed by the Poundmaster within twelve hours from the time of impounding the same, provided, however, that notice to the owner of said animal of the intention of said Poundmaster to destroy said animal shall be given, if the owner is known to said Poundmaster.

Section 7. The Poundmaster shall cause all animals impounded by him to be provided with sufficient food and water suitable for such animal.

Section 8. If at any time within twelve months after any sale is made under the provisions of this Ordinance any person shall prove by competent evidence to the satisfaction of the Board of Trustees that he or she was the owner of the animal sold, the Board of Trustees may allow a claim in favor of such person payable out of the City Treasury for the amount paid into the treasury, less all legal costs and charges on account of the impounding, keep and sale of said animal or animals. Provided further, that the owner may also redeem the animal or animals sold under the pro-

visions of this Ordinance at any time within sixty days after the sale by producing satisfactory proof of ownership and paying the purchaser the amount of purchase money in Gold Coin which he had theretofore paid to the City Marshal at such sale, with interest at the rate of 5 per cent per month, but if no redemption or tender of redemption be made within sixty days after the sale, such bill of sale shall be conclusive evidence of title in favor of the purchaser or the animal or animals therein mentioned.

Section 9. The Poundmaster shall keep a record of all his acts as Poundmaster, and in any action or proceedings involving the legality of the action of the Poundmaster, the entry in the Poundmaster's books shall be prima facie evidence of the facts therein registered.

Section 10. If any person shall interfere with, oppose or resist the Poundmaster or any of his assistants while engaged in performing any duty imposed by this Ordinance, or shall, without permission of the Poundmaster, remove or take away any animal from the pound, or remove any fence, bar or barrier, or open any gate for the purpose of enabling any animal to escape from the pound, he or she shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not less than Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00) nor more than Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00), or by imprisonment in the County Jail of Monterey County not exceeding ninety (90) days, or by both such fine and imprisonment. The judgment imposing the fine may provide for its collection by imprisonment at the rate of one day for each \$2.00 of the fine.

Section 11. If any animal impounded under the provisions of this ordinance be not redeemed and cannot be sold in the manner herein provided, the Poundmaster shall kill and bury the same in the manner herein-after provided, and shall be entitled to receive the fees herein provided for from the owner or owners thereof.

Section 12. It shall be the duty of the Poundmaster to bury all animals that may die or be found dead within the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea. Said animals shall be buried at least four feet deep under the ground upon the premises of the owner thereof, if in the judgment of the Poundmaster such place would be a suitable place for burying such animal, or on the premises of others with the written consent of the owner thereof. Said animals must be buried within forty-eight (48) hours after the same shall die, and upon the request of any owner or possessor of said dead animal, it shall be the duty of the Poundmaster to proceed to bury the same. The Poundmaster shall collect in advance from the owner of said dead animal, for burying any horse, mare, colt, ass, jack, mule, ox, bull, steer or cow the sum of \$5.00 each, and for burying any calf, sheep, goat, hog or dog, the sum of \$2.50 each.

Section 13. If any person shall fail or neglect to bury any dead animal as provided in this Ordinance, then and

in such case, it shall be the duty of the Poundmaster to proceed forthwith to bury the same and it shall be lawful for him to charge to and recover from the owner of such dead animal the fees herein provided for, and if any person shall fail, neglect or refuse to bury any such animal or to notify the Poundmaster of any dead animal on his or her premises of which he or she is the owner or possessor as provided in this ordinance, or to pay the poundmaster his lawful fee, he or she shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$10.00 nor more than \$40.00, or by imprisonment in the County Jail of Monterey County not exceeding thirty (30) days, or by both such fine and imprisonment. The judgment imposing the fine may provide for its collection by imprisonment at the rate of one day for each \$2.00 of the fine.

Section 14. In the event that the Poundmaster, after diligent search, cannot find the owner of such dead animal buried by him, he shall be entitled to receive one-half of the fees herein provided for from the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea for the burial of such dead animal upon his filing a verified claim therefor with the Board of Trustees of said City.

Section 15. It shall be unlawful for any person to wilfully abandon or turn loose to run at large in the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea any animal rendered unfit for further use by disease, old age, injury or any other cause, and any person violating the provisions of this section shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$20.00, nor more than \$50.00, or by imprisonment in the County Jail of Monterey County not exceeding sixty (60) days, or by both such fine and imprisonment. The judgment imposing such fine may provide for its collection by imprisonment at the rate of one day for each \$2.00 of the fine.

Section 16. The Poundmaster shall make a true and correct report to the Board of Trustees of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea at the first regular meeting in each month of all his acts under this Ordinance, setting forth, among other things, the number and kind of each animal impounded by him during the preceding month, the number redeemed, sold or destroyed, and when and by whom redeemed or purchased, the amount received from the sale or redemption thereof, the number and kind buried and the amount received therefor.

Section 17. The marshal of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea shall be ex-officio Poundmaster and said Poundmaster shall pay all fees collected by him into the City Treasury. The Poundmaster shall retain all money collected by him for the keep of animals under the provisions of this Ordinance.

Section 18. This Ordinance is declared to be an emergency measure required for the immediate preservation of public health and safety. The facts constituting its urgency be-

ing as follows:

Many of the animals aforementioned are now running at large throughout the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea and are a source of danger to life and limb, and are destroying and injuring gardens and growing plants and no provision has been made for disposing of dead animals, and therefore the foregoing Ordinance shall be in full force and effect immediately from and after its final passage and approval.

ORDINANCE NO. 7

AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE CUTTING DOWN, REMOVAL, MUTILATION AND INJURY OF TREES, SHRUBS AND BUSHES ON ANY OF THE PUBLIC STREETS, PARKS AND PUBLIC PLACES OF THE CITY OF CARMEL-BY-THE-SEA.

THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE CITY OF CARMEL-BY-THE-SEA DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS, TO-WIT:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to cut down, remove, injure or mutilate any tree, shrub or bush growing or standing upon any of the streets, squares, parks or public places of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea.

Section 2. Nothing in this Ordinance contained shall in any manner be deemed to prohibit the proper authorities nor the Board of Trustees or Superintendent of Streets or the Commissioner of Streets of said City of Carmel-by-the-Sea from ordering the cutting down or removal of any tree, shrub or bush growing on any of the streets, squares, parks or public places of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea, if in the judgment of said authorities, Board of Trustees, Superintendent of Streets or Commissioner of Streets of said City the public interest shall require the same.

Section 3. Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by imprisonment in the County Jail of Monterey County not exceeding ninety days, or by a fine not exceeding \$100.00, or by both such fine and imprisonment. The judgment imposing the fine may provide for its collection by imprisonment at the rate of one day for each \$2.00 of the fine.

Section 4. This ordinance is declared to be urgent and necessary for the immediate preservation of public health, peace and safety, and shall take effect upon its final passage and approval.

ORDINANCE NO. 8

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO THE DISCHARGING OF FIRE-ARMS, THE USE OF CERTAIN WEAPONS AND THE EXPLOSION OF FIRECRACKERS, ROMAN CANDLES, SKY-ROCKETS AND LIKE ARTICLES, THE KINDLING OF BONFIRES OR CAMP FIRES WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF THE CITY OF CARMEL-BY-THE-SEA.

THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE CITY OF CARMEL-BY-THE-SEA DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person within the corporate limits of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea to discharge any firearm or any weapon or mechanical appliance of any character whatsoever, by means of which any bullet, shot, stone, dart or any projectile shall be propelled, sprung or thrown from one place to another.

Section 2. It shall be unlawful for any person to make, build or maintain bonfires, camp fires or fires for burning hay, straw, shavings or other waste or combustible material on any street, alley, square or public place within the city limits of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea without first having obtained written permission therefor from the Commissioner of Streets, Sidewalks and Parks of this Board, and without notifying the Marshal.

Section 3. It shall be unlawful for any person to explode, fire off or discharge within the corporate limits of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea any firecracker, Roman candle, skyrocket, squib or fireworks of any kind, except at the places hereinafter provided for, under the supervision and with the permission of the Marshal.

Section 4. It shall be permissible, upon obtaining the consent of the Marshal and under his supervision, to build bonfires or camp fires and to explode, fire off or discharge firecrackers, Roman candles, skyrockets, squibs and other fireworks on the sea beach or on the sand dunes which slope facing the sea within the corporate limits of said City.

Section 5. Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by imprisonment in the County Jail of Monterey County not exceeding ninety days, or by a fine not exceeding \$100, or by both such fine and imprisonment. The judgment imposing the fine may provide for its collection by imprisonment at the rate of one day for each \$2.00 of the fine.

Section 6. This ordinance is declared to be urgent and necessary for the immediate preservation of public health, peace and safety, and shall take effect upon its final passage and approval.

ORDINANCE NO. 9

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO THE FISCAL YEAR OF THE CITY OF CARMEL-BY-THE-SEA.

THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE CITY OF CARMEL-BY-THE-SEA DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The fiscal year of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea shall commence on the first day of January.

Section 2. This Ordinance is hereby declared to be urgent and necessary to carry on the form of government provided by the incorporation of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea and for the immediate preservation of the public health, peace and safety, and shall take effect and be in force from and after its final passage.
