## ORDINANCE NU. 8

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person within the corporate lim its of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea to discharge any firearm or any weapon or mechanical appliance of any which any bullet, shot, stone, dart or any projectile shall be propelled, sprung or thrown from one place to another.
Section 2. It shall be unlawful for any person to make, build or maintain bonfires, camp fires or fires for burning hay, straw, shavings or other waste or combustible material on any street, alley, square or public place within the city limits of the City of Chrmel-by-the-Sea without first hav ing obtained written permission therefor from the Commissioner of Streets, Sidewalks and Parks of this Board, and without notifying the Marshal.

Section 3. It shall be unlawful for any person to explode, fire off or discharge within the corporate limits of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea any firecracker, Roman candle, skyrocket, squib or fireworks of any kind, except at the places hereinafter provided for, under the supervision and with the permission of the Marshal.
Secton 4. It shall be permissible, upon obtaining the consent of the Marshal and under his supervision, to build bonfires or camp fires and to explode, fire off or discharge firecrackers, Roman candles, skyrockets, squibs and other fireworks on the sea beach or on the sand dunes which slope facing the sea within the corporate limits of said City.
Section 5. Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdeameanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by imprisonment in the County Jail of Monte rey County not exceeding ninety days, or by a fine not excedin
$\$ 100$, or by both such fine and im prisonment. The judgment imposing the fine may provide for its collection by imprisonment at the rate of one day for each $\$ 2.00$ of the fine.

Trustee de Sabla, Commissioner of Streets, read a letter from Mrs. A. D. Signor, asking for better roadway approashes to La Playa. The matter will be considered.
Miss L. R. Lichtenthaler addressed the board in protest against the restrictions concerning the buring of brush on the streets. Chairman Fraser had the clerk read a section of Ordinance No. 8, covering the matter, showing the protestant the proper procedure. Come as the wind comes when forests are rended;
Come as the waves come, when navies are stranded!"
Five years later this quotation in spired the strain,
"We are coming, Father Abraham. five hundred thousand strong."

# Notice to TAXPAYERS 

All taxpayers are required by the constitution to annually make and deliver to the Assessor a statement, under oath, setting forth specifically A L L the real, personal, or other class of property, owned by such persons, or $\ln$ their possession, or under their control, as the same stands of record at 12 o'clock Meridian on the first Monday of March.

The Political Code provides, that all property must be assessed at its "full cash value," and defines "full cash value" as being "the amount at which the projerty would be taken in payment of a just debt from a solvent debtor.
Unsecured Personal Property
The taxes on all unsecured personal property are due and payable and must be paid at the time the assessment is made.

## Exemptions

Any person or association, claiming any property to be exempt from taxation, MUST make the claim and affidavit, for such exemption, every year, in the manner provided by law. This applies to the $\$ 100$ allowed on personal property of householders; the $\$ 1000$ allowed soldiers, sailors, marines, etc., and property used solely and exclusively for religious worship.

## Assessments

Any information desired relating to assessments will be gladly furnished on application, and all objections should be made before the Board of Equalization adjourns, instead of waiting until it is time to pay taxes.

Remember, that if you fail to make a statement you fail to comply with the law and you law yourself liable to arbitrary assessment, which is expensive to yourself and causes much trouble to others.

The following is the text of Assemblyman W. J. Martin's bill relating to the protection of abalones in Fish and Game Districts Nos. 16, 17 and 18:
The people of the State of California do enact as follows:
Section 1. A new section is hereby added to the Penal Code, to be numbered 628 j , and to read as follows:
628 j . It shall be unlawful for any person to take, catch, kill, destroy or person his possession, any abalone (Haliotis), or any species thereof, for (Hainotis, or any species the waters
commercial purposes, from the wate of the Pacific Ocean, or from along the shore line thereof embraced within fish and game districts number sixteen. seventeen and eighteen; provided, that nothing in this act shall be construed to mean or to prevent thy person from taking abalones (Hal. iotis) for his personal use within fish and game districts number sixteen, eventeen and eighteen during the open season and of the sizes regulated by law, to the extent of twenty of said abalones (Haliotis) in any one calendar week. It shall be unlawful for any person to use in the taking catching, or killing of abalones, any spear, boat or diving apparatus of any kind. Any person violating any of the provisions of this section is guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be subjeet to a penalty of not less than fifty nor more than one hundred dollar for each offense, or imprisonment in the county jail for a period of not less than thirty, nor more than sixty days.
