This is the first gauntlet that the bill must run in the Legislature. The next hurdle is a difficult one, but Senator Rigdon is confident that it will pass that also.

ORDINANCE NO. 8

City Trustees Hold Monthly Meeting

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person within the corporate limits of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea to discharge any firearm or any weapon or mechanical appliance of any character whatsoever, by means of which any bullet, shot, stone, dart or any projectile shall be propelled, sprung or thrown from one place to another.

Section 2. It shall be unlawful for any person to make, build or maintain bonfires, camp fires or fires for burning hay, straw, shavings or other waste or combustible material on any street, alley, square or public place within the city limits of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea without first having obtained written permission therefor from the Commissioner of Streets, Sidewalks and Parks of this Board, and without notifying the Marshal.

Section 3. It shall be unlawful for any person to explode, fire off or discharge within the corporate limits of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea any firecracker, Roman candle, skyrocket, squib or fireworks of any kind, except at the places hereinafter provided for, under the supervision and with the permission of the Marshal.

Section 4. It shall be permissible, upon obtaining the consent of the Marshal and under his supervision, to build bonfires or camp fires and to explode, fire off or discharge firecrackers, Roman candles, skyrockets, squibs and other fireworks on the sea beach or on the sand dunes which slope facing the sea within the corporate limits of said City.

Section 5. Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by imprisonment in the County Jail of Monterey County not exceeding ninety days, or by a fine not exceeding \$100, or by both such fine and imprisonment. The judgment imposing the fine may provide for its collection by imprisonment at the rate of one day for each \$2.00 of the fine.

Miss L. R. Lichtenthaler addressed the board in protest against the restrictions concerning the burying of brush on the streets. Chairman Fraser had the clerk read a section of Ordinance No. 8, covering the matter, showing the protestant the proper procedure. For the information of the public, Ordinance No. 8 is re-published in this issue of the Pine Cone.

MOCK CARAMEL CUSTARD

Two level teaspoonfuls of cereal coffee dissolved in one cupful of boiling water; add to this one pint of hot milk, one-half cupful sugar, two full tablespoon of cornstarch dissolved in little cold milk, pinch of salt, piece of butter size of walnut. Cook 20 minutes in double boiler, then remove from fire and flavor with vanilla. Pour into moulds, serve with whipped cream.

It is by believing in, loving, and following illimitable ideals that man grows great. Their very impossibility is their highest virtue. They live before us as the image of that into which we are to grow forever.—Stopford Brooke.

A Desirable Movement

A movement for the study of the career of Abraham Lincoln, now largely confined to the Middle West, is showing considerable growth just now.

In 1856, when a tremendous issue was forcing itself upon the nation, Lincoln made, at Bloomington, Ill., what has been called his "lost speech."

Necessity of a deeper study of Lincoln by adults as well as children is made evident by the increasing frequency with which students of the great President apply his sayings or his acts to conditions of today.

Although no notes were taken, the speech above referred to was not lost. It was pieced together by those who heard it. In it Lincoln appealed to every element in his party and in his country to stand for the right, regardless of pressure for compromise or expediency, closing with a remarkable peroration, at the end of which he stretched forth his long arms in invitation to all his countrymen, declaiming with irresistible force:

"Come as the wind comes when forests are rended;

"Come as the waves come, when navies are stranded!"

Five years later this quotation inspired the strain,

"We are coming, Father Abraham, five hundred thousand strong."

Of Course They're Loyal

The representative newspapers of the southern section of the United States have been as quick in their patriotic response to the call to loyalty as have those of other sections of the Union. It may have been supposed by some persons unfamiliar with the real attitude of the South toward the European situation that there may have existed there a feeling that the crisis was one in which the people of the Atlantic Coast section were most directly concerned. Notice to TAXPAYERS

All taxpayers are required by the constitution to annually make and deliver to the Assessor a statement, under oath, setting forth specifically ALL the real, personal, or other class of property, owned by such persons, or in their possession, or under their control, as the same stands of record at 12 o'clock Meridian on the first Monday of March.

The Political Code provides, that all property must be assessed at its "full cash value," and defines "full cash value" as being "the amount at which the property would be taken in payment of a just debt from a solvent debtor.

Unsecured Personal Property

The taxes on all unsecured personal property are due and payable and must be paid at the time the assessment is made.

Exemptions

Any person or association, claiming any property to be exempt from taxation, MUST make the claim and affidavit, for such exemption, every year, in the manner provided by law. This applies to the \$100 allowed on personal property of householders; the \$1000 allowed soldiers, sailors, marines, etc., and property used solely and exclusively for religious worship.

Assessments

Any information desired relating to assessments will be gladly furnished on application, and all objections should be made before the Board of Equalization adjourns, instead of waiting until it is time to pay taxes.

Remember, that if you fail to make a statement you fail to comply with the law and you law yourself liable to arbitrary assessment, which is expensive to yourself and causes much trouble to others.

Charles O. Goold of Carmel has petitioned the Superior Court for letters of administration in the estate of his father, Horace Goold, who died February 16th, and of the estate of his mother, Hannah Goold, who died February 20th. The estate consists of money and a lot in Monterey. The total valuation is less than \$2500.

The following is the text of Assemblyman W. J. Martin's bill relating to the protection of abalones in Fish and Game Districts Nos. 16, 17 and 18:

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

Section 1. A new section is hereby added to the Penal Code, to be numbered 628j, and to read as follows:

628j. It shall be unlawful for any person to take, catch, kill, destroy or have in his possession, any abalone (*Haliotis*), or any species thereof, for commercial purposes, from the waters of the Pacific Ocean, or from along the shore line thereof embraced within fish and game districts number sixteen, seventeen and eighteen; provided, that nothing in this act shall be construed to mean or to prevent any person from taking abalones (*Haliotis*) for his personal use within fish and game districts number sixteen, seventeen and eighteen during the open season and of the sizes regulated by law, to the extent of twenty of said abalones (*Haliotis*) in any one calendar week. It shall be unlawful for any person to use in the taking, catching, or killing of abalones, any spear, boat or diving apparatus of any kind. Any person violating any of the provisions of this section is guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be subject to a penalty of not less than fifty nor more than one hundred dollars for each offense, or imprisonment in the county jail for a period of not less than thirty, nor more than sixty days.
