Referendum Not Practical
Thuse who are suggesting a nation - wide referendum on war or no war, should occasion arise, are not practical.
A referendum would have to await the perpetration of a more or less gross overt act.
The American people are, without question, almost unanimous for peace. Our President has been showing the world that he will keep us at peace until conditions arise whereby he would not have the support of the people unless he took drastic action, and those conditions are not remote; they are imminent.
The emergency may come any day. A referendum then would be impossible without serious delay, and Congress would have to act in any event.
These things being so. public meetings and utterances tending to embarrass or interfere with the officials who must make the decision, would be closely related to treason. The probable enemy must not be encouraged to believe that this nation is divided against itself.

## Eat Rice

A pound and a half of California rice may be purchased for the price of a pound of potatoes. The potatoes consist of 78.3 per cent water. The rice contains 12.4 per cent water. You cook water out of potatoes, and you cook water into rice. So your pound of potatoes produces considerably less than a pound of food, while your pound and a half of rice produces several pounds. two is in favor of rice, the figures being, rice 86.9 per cent, potatoes 23.2 per cent. By actual computation, then, potatoes now cost about eight times that of rice, for equal food value.

Notice to TAXPAYERS

All taxpayers are required by the constitution to annually make and deliver to the Assessor a statement, under oath, setting forth specifically ALL the real, personal, or other class of property, owned by such persons, or in their possession, or under their control, as the same stands of record at $120^{\prime}$ clock Meridian on the first Monday of March.
The Political Code provides, that all property must be assessed at its "full cash value," and defines "full cash value" as being "the amount at which the property would be taken in payment of a just debt from a solvent debtor.'
Unsecured Personal Property
The taxes on all unsecured personal property are due and payable and must be paid at the time the assessment is made.

## Exemptions

Any person or association, claiming any property to be exempt from taxation, MUST make the claim and affidavit, for such exemption, every year, in the manner provided by law. This applies to the $\$ 100$ allowed on personal property of householders; the $\$ 1000$ allowed soldiers, sailors, marines, etc., and property used solely and exclusively for religious worship.

## Assessments

Any information desired relating to assessments will be gladly furnished on application, and all objections should be made before the Board of Equalization adjourns, instead of waiting until it is time to pay taxes.
Remember, that if you fail to make a statement you fail to comply with the law and you law yourself liable to arbitrary assessment, which is expensive to yourself and causes much trouble to others.
