ORDINANCE NO. 12

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE LICENSING, REGISTRATION AND IMPOUNDING OF DOGS IN THE CITY OF CARMEL-BY-THE-SEA, AND PROVIDING PENAL-TIES FOR VIOLATIONS THERE-OF

THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE CITY OF CARMEL-BY-THE-SEA DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Every person owning or having control of any dog in the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea shall pay a license tax of Two Dollars (\$2.00) per annum as provided herein on each and every female dog so owned or controlled by him, and a license tax of \$1.50 per annum as provided herein on such dog or dogs and shall state that each and every male dog so owned or unless reclaimed, it or they will be controlled by him. The license shall sold at public auction to the highest be dated the first day of January of each year unless it is issued on or after the first day of July, in which case it shall be dated the first day of July. and shall be void on the first day of January, or the first day of July, respectively, thereafter.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the Marshal to collect said license tax and to procure, at the expense of the City, metallic plates or tags having thereon numbers corresponding to numbers of license issued, and figures indicating the year for which said tax is payable. He shall furnish a plate or tag with number corresponding to license number, to each person paying a tax, and shall enter into a book to be kept for that purpose the name of the owner and a description of the dog so entered.

ection 3. Every registered dog shall be provided by the owner or possessor thereof with a suitable collar at least three fourths (3-4) of an inch wide, or some other suitable device to which shall be attached the plate or tag provided for in Section 2 hereof, and such collar or device must be worn by such registered dog at all

Section 4. Whenever a dog tag, issued for the current year by the Marshal, has been lost, or taken, or stolen by parties unknown to the owner or

r or person having control of su dog may, on the payment of Fifty (50) Cents and on making and subscribing to an affidavit of such loss of such tag, receive from the Murshal a duplicate tag for the remaining portion of the year for which the original tag was issued

Section 5. Every dog not registered or registered and not wearing a collar or device as herein provided, found running or being at large on any pub-lic street, lane, alley, park or other public place in said City shall be taken up by the Poundmaster and impound-

The Marshal shall immediately notify the owner thereof in writing, if known to him and shall post three (3) notices in three public places. Said notices shall contain a description of bidder, at a time and place to be speci-fied in said notice, which shall not be less than three or more than ten days from the posting thereof, and if said dog or dogs are not reclaimed before the expiration of the time specified in the notice, the Poundmaster shall proceed to sell the same at the time and place and in the manner specified in said notice. In case there is no bidber for said dog or dogs, the Poundmaster shall kill the same without unnecessary cruelty, and bury the same

as provided by Ordinance of said City. Section 6. The owner of any dog impounded shall have the right to reclaim the same at any time prior to the sale thereof upon payment to the Poundmaster of the cost and charges nance for impounding and keeping proval. said animal, or if sold, to receive the proceeds of the sale thereof, less the cost and charges aforesaid, within thirty (30) days after said sale, upon

any dog taken and impounded or kent by him the sum of Two Dollars (\$2.00), and a further sum for keeping the same per day of Ten Cents (10c) for each dog.

Section 8. Any person owning or person having control of the dog for having charge, care or control of any

ch own- dog, who shall permit or allow the of such same to run at large on any street, lane, alley, park or other public place within the corporate limits of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea, and any person who shall permit or allow any dog to be kept or to remain upon any prem ises under his immediate control, un less such dog shall be registered and shall have a collar attached thereon on which there shall be a tag inscribed as in this Ordinance provided shall be deemed guilty of a misdemen-nor, and, upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by a fine not exceed ing Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00). The judgment imposing such fine may provide for its collection by imprison in the County Jail of Monterey County, California, for the time, at the rate, and in the manner provided by

Section 9. Any person who shall imitate or counterfeit the tags in this Ordinance provided for, or who shall use any imitation or counterfeit of such tag, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and, upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding Fifty Dollars (\$50.00), or by imprisonment for a period not exceeding fifty (50) days in the Coun ty Jail of Monterey County, or by both such fine and imprisonment. The judgment imposing such fine may provide for its collection by imprisonment in the County Jail of Monte rey (ounty, California, for the time, at the rate, and in the manner provided by h.w.

speakers based their remarks. The audience was roused to a high pitch of enthusiasm. not only by the fervid remarks of the speakers, but by the singing of patriotic airs, led by Mrs. Mabel Gray Young. and by the display of United States fllags.

Almost without exception the speakers affirmed their fealty to the principle of peace; they deplored the necessity of the United States going to war. But the overwhelming sentiment of those present was, that, being at war, not of our own initiative, but by force of circumstances, it was the duty of every citizen to back the President and Congress to the limit, that the war be brought to a conclusion successful for the United States.

It was pointed out that the participation of this country in the war is an act in behalf of all mankind. No longer shall it be possible for autocratic government, such as is represented by the German Kaiser. to exist. The United States enters this conflict with high ideals and a beneficent purpose—i.e., the inculcation of the principle of government of, for and by the people.

For seventeen minutes the audience, with demonstrations of disapproval, listened to Dr. P. W. Search's pacifistic re-marks. The speaker, while satisfactory proof of his or her owner. A. D. 1917, by the following vote:

Ayes: Trustees Fraser, Beardsley,
declaring his sympathy with
the spirit of the resolution. did not endorse that paragraph which stated that the Presi-dent had exhausted every honorable means to avoid a conflict. Dr. Search very evidently selected the wrong time and the wrong occasion for a dissertation on peace, judging from the wild applause which greeted the remarks of those who replied to him. Mrs. R. J. DeYoe and others

made strong appeals for co-operation in the work of the Red Cross.

The resolution was adopted by a standing vote. Not a voice was raised in objection.

Amidst the waving of flags and the singing of "America" the first patriotic meeting in Monterey county, since the declaration of war, adjourned.

Notice to TAXPAYERS

All taxpayers are required by the constitution to annually make and deliver to the Assessor a statement, under oath, setting forth specifically ALL the real, personal, or other class of property, owned by such persons, or in their possession, or under their control, as the same stands of record at 12 o'clock Meridian on the first Monday of March.

The Political Code provides, that all property must be assessed at its "full cash value," and defines "full cash value" as being "the amount at which the property would be taken in payment of a just debt from a solvent debtor."

Unsecured Personal Property

The taxes on all unsecured personal property are due and payable and must be paid at the time the assessment is made.

Exemptions

Any person or association, claiming any property to be exempt from taxation, MUST make the claim and affidavit, for such exemption, every year, in the manner provided by law. This applies to the \$100 allowed on personal property of householders; the \$1000 allowed soldiers, sailors, marines, etc., and property used solely and exclusively for religious worship.

Any information desired relating to assessments will be gladly furnished on application, and all objections should be made before the Board of Equalization adjourns, instead of waiting until it is time to pay taxes.

Remember, that if you fail to make a statement you fail to comply with the law and you law yourself liable to arbitrary assessment, which is expensive to yourself and causes much trouble to others.
