"I will mot change one word I have spoken against war, but the issules are now changed. At home and abroad the first question is now the world-wide defeuse of Government by the people and for the people."

Notice to TAXPAYERS

All taxpayers are required by the constitution to annually make and deliver to the Assessor a statement, under oath, setting forth specifically ALL the real, personal, or other class of property, owned by such persons, or in their possession, or under their control, as the same stands of record at 120 'clock Meridian on the first Monday of March.
The Political Code provides, that all property must be assessed at its "full cash value," and defines "full cash value" as being "the amount at which the property would be taken: in payment of a just debt from a solvent debtor.'
Unsecured Personal Property
The taxes on all unsecured per sonal property are due and payable and must be paid at the time the assessment is made.

## Exemptions

Any person or association, claiming any property to be exempt from taxation, MUST make the claim and affidavit, for such exemption, every year, in the manner provided by law. This applies to the $\$ 100$ allowed on personal property of householders; the $\$ 1000$ allowed soldiers, sailors, marines, etc., and property used solely and exclusively for religions worship.

## Assessments

Any information desired relating to assessments will be gladly furnished on application, and all ob jections should be made before the Board of Equalization adjoums, instead of waiting until it is time to pay taxes.
Remember, that if you fail to make a statement you fail to comply with the law and you law your self liable to arbitrary assessment. which is expensive to yourself and causes much tronble to others.
