It seems that the consumer; always gets the worst of the deal when food speculators corner the market and force prices upward. The producer may sell at or below the cost of production, but this may not bencfit the consumer, who is often at the mercy of market manipulators for his necessities. It is surprising the way speculators raise prices and the pretext they offer for it. The European war has been blamed for raises in prices; lack of transporta-tion; short crops, and many other things. Some commodities have been affected by these things and others as a direct result of manipulation of the market. The consumer is easily fleeced. He will generally accept any kind of a story as to why prices are high, pay the bill and complain afterwards. With, the food stocks we have in this country there is no good reason for food riots and hungry people. Lack of transportation, poor business in distribution, speculation and other things are at fault. The consumer must act before there will be any considerable relief in the high cost of living. The producer and honest dealers are anxious to meet consumers and help them save marketing cost. How long will the consumer submit to extortion?

What a difference. Hayes, an American, votes "No" on the Conscription Bill. Kahn, born in Germany, worked hard for the measure, and voted "Yes."





Wash, pare and cut potatoes in one-third inch eubes; there should be three cupfuls. Parboil three minutes and brain. Add one-third cupful of butter and cock very slowly till potatoes are soft and slightly browned. In a small pan melt two tablespoonfuls of bui-ter, add a few drops of onion juice, two tablespoonfuls of flour and pour on gradually one capful of hot milk Season with sait and paprika. class of property, owned by such persons, or in their possession, or under their control, as the same stands of record at 12 o'clock Meridian on the first Monday of March. The Political Code provides, that

all property must be assessed at its "full cash value," and defines "full cash value" as being "the amount at which the property would be

The taxes on all unsecured personal property are due and payable and must be paid at the time the

Any person or association, claiming any property to be exempt from taxation, MUST make the claim and affidavit, for such exemption, every year, in the manner provided by law. This applies to the \$100 allowed on personal property of householders; the \$1000 allowed soldiers, sailors, marines, etc., and property used solely and exclusively for religions

Assessments

Any information desired relating to assessments will be gladly furnished on application, and all objections should be made before the Board of Equalization adjourns, instead of waiting until it is time to pay taxes.

Remember, that if you fail to make a statement you fail to comply with the law and you law yourself liable to arbitrary assessment, which is expensive to yourself and causes much trouble to others. GEO. S. GOULD, Jr.
