 RICE AND CHEESE.Ingredients-one ounce rice, one grated cheese, one ounce butter, two pint milk, seasoning, six ounces ounces flour and a little made mustard. Method Sprinkle the rice into a pan of boiling water and cook until the grain is soft but whole. Make a sauce of the butter, flour and milk, boiling well to cook the flour. # Notice to <br> TAXPAYERS 

All taxpayers are required by the constitution to annually make and deliver to the Assessor a statement, under oath, setting forth specifically A LL the real, personal, or other class of propenty, owned by such persons, or in their possession, or under their control, as the same stands of record at $120^{\prime}$ clock Meridian on the first Monday of March.

The Political Code provides, that all property must be assessed at its "full cash value," and defines cash value" as being "the amoir at which the proverty wou'd 1 taken in payment of a just dilt from a solvent debtor."
Unsecured Personal Property
The taxes on all unsecured per sonal property are due and payable and must be paid at the time the assessment is made.

Exemptions
Any person or association, claiming any property to be exempt from taxation, MUST make the claim and affidavit, for such exemption, every year, in the manner provided by law. This applies to the $\$ 100$ allowed on personal property of householders; the $\$ 1000$ allowed soldiers, sailors, marines, etc., and property used solely and exclusively for religious worship.

Assessments
Any information desired relating to assessments will be gladly furnished on application, and all objections should be made before the Board of Equalization adjourns, instead of waiting until it is time to pay taxes.
Remember, that if you fail to make a statement you fail to comply with the law and you law yourself liable to arbitrary assessment, which is expensive to yourself and causes mueh trouble to others.
