"I hereby designate the period of June 23 to June 30 next as recruiting week for the Regular Army, and call upon unmarried men between the ages of 18 and 40 years, who have no dependents and who are not engaged in pursuits vitally necessary to the prosecution of the war, to present themselves for enlistment during the week herein designated, to the number of 70,000.

Carmel's Splendid Response to Appeal of Red Cross

"Little old New York!"

Pshaw! It's not in it with Little old Carmel. When it comes to over-subscribing, you've got to hand it to us.

With a keen committee, working systematically and continuously for seven days, Carmel chapter reports to the Washington Red Cross headquarters that \$2400.00—get that?—\$2400.00 has been raised here and hereabouts toward the Hundred Million Red Cross War Fund.

Carmel-by-the-Sea and vicinity, with a population of about 650, has given more than three dollars each for every man, woman and child.

Of the \$25,000 apportioned to Monterey county, Carmel has contributed nearly a tenth, with very much less than one-fortieth of the population of the entire county.

Boast! Well haven't we a right to boast? It was intended that the names of the contributors be published in the Pine Cone. That is not necessary, as practically everybody gave something. The largest subscription was \$100. Others ranged from 10 cents to \$25.

Like the Liberty Loan, the total amount called for was over-subscribed. But unlike the Liberty Loan, the over-subscription will be retained by the American Red Cross—for the good it can do.

To such an extent have the activities of the local chapter grown that it has been found necessary to reorganize and systemize the work.

The partitions in the work-room have been removed to afford more space for tables and sewing machines.

Several more machines are needed.

Classes in surgical dressing will soon be inaugurated.

Work for 4000 Paid Admissions to the Summer Plays

With the Liberty Bond drive almost a forgotten excitement and the big drive for the Red Cross a thing of the past, interest is now centered upon rolling up the largest attendance in its history for the four performances of the Forest Theatre summer plays on July 3rd, 4th, 6th and 7th. A new record of seat sales is hoped for, as the usual interest in Forest Theatre offerings is augmented by the fact that the entire net receipts are to be donated to the local chapter of the Red Cross. There are more than a thousand reserved seats, and it is proposed to fill them all every night.

Expenses of the productions are being kept at the minimum, costumes being made by a committee of ladies, stage sets and properties by artists and members of the casts, and everything that would in ordinary years mean financial outlay is being reduced to the extreme limit or eliminated entirely, so that the returns to the Red Cross may be as large as possible. Volunteer labor is supplying the place of paid help, resulting in more efficient accomplishment at less cost.

"A Thousand Years Ago" and "The Blue Bird" are in the final stages of rehearsal, with gratifying certitude of excellent performances. No better casts have ever played here. No more beautiful sets have ever been seen. The lighting effects have been improved, and the costumes are exquisite. In both plays the dances are delightful, and the music better than ever before.

Carmel may rest assured that the summer of 1917 will take high place in the annals of its open-air playhouse.

From now on rehearsals will be strictly private, and the gates will be closed to all but the actors.

The first day's ticket sales, at the office of the Carmel Development Co., were large.

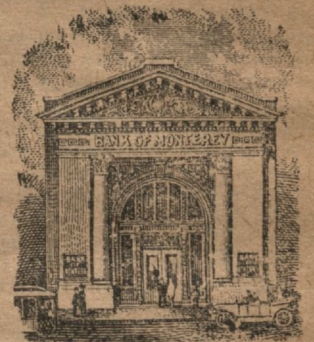

Notice to TAXPAYERS

All taxpayers are required by the constitution to annually make and deliver to the Assessor a statement, under oath, setting forth specifically ALL the real, personal, or other class of property, owned by such persons, or in their possession, or under their control, as the same stands of record at 12 o'clock Meridian on the first Monday of March.

The Political Code provides, that all property must be assessed at its "full cash value," and defines "full cash value" as being "the amount at which the property would be taken in payment of a just debt from a solvent debtor."

Unsecured Personal Property

The taxes on all unsecured personal property are due and payable and must be paid at the time the assessment is made.

Exemptions

Any person or association, claiming any property to be exempt from taxation, MUST make the claim and affidavit, for such exemption, every year, in the manner provided by law. This applies to the \$100 allowed on personal property of householders; the \$1000 allowed soldiers, sailors, marines, etc., and property used solely and exclusively for religious worship.

Assessments

Any information desired relating to assessments will be gladly furnished on application, and all objections should be made before the Board of Equalization adjourns, instead of waiting until it is time to pay taxes.

Remember, that if you fail to make a statement you fail to comply with the law and you law yourself liable to arbitrary assessment, which is expensive to yourself and causes much trouble to others.

California Historical Survey

One of the most important measures passed by the recent Legislature, and approved by Governor Stephens, and one of especial interest to Carmel, is Senate Bill No. 1021, which reads as follows:

Section 1. Section four of an act entitled "An act to create a commission for the purpose of making a survey of local historical material in the State of California; defining the power and duties of said commission; and making an appropriation therefor," approved June 12, 1915, is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 4. The purpose of this commission shall be to make a survey of the material on local history within the State of California by investigating documents in local depositories and in the possession of private individuals and other sources of original information on the early history of the State of California and to compile, keep and publish a record of such sources of information and to investigate the physical characteristics of the several missions which were maintained in the State of California under the charge of the Franciscan Fathers prior to the time of the secularization thereof, and to cause to be made a record thereof, and to be created models of the several mission buildings and outbuildings connected therewith, which shall be accurate representations of the mission buildings and outbuildings connected with the same as they were at the time when the Franciscan Fathers were in charge, and the same shall be known respectively as the California Model of each particular mission in question, and the said commission shall cause to be prepared

plans and specifications sufficient in detail to enable any of said buildings and outbuildings to be restored, and the commission shall have authority to pass upon and determine the relative accuracy of information to be obtained and to establish for the state the models and plans and specifications thereof; provided, however, that no model shall be established as the correct model of any mission unless the said commission shall first have published for a period of at least sixty days a notice to the public fixing a time and place at which any person interested in the said respective mission, or having information as to the condition of said mission buildings, or any part thereof, may present to the commission facts, papers, documents, records or other information substantiating the said person's ideas as to the condition of said mission buildings at the time in question, which notice must be published in one newspaper in the city of San Francisco, one newspaper in the city of Sacramento, one newspaper in the city of Los Angeles, and one newspaper in the county in which said mission building was situated.

It has been suggested that it would help matters if it was suggested to the public that any person who has information as to the whereabouts of any of the material that was formerly connected with the Carmel Mission or any of the appliances, would communicate with The Pine Cone.

If the Commission were able to obtain all local information from one point, its work would be expedited.

WEEKLY GREETING

We shall fight for a universal dominion of right by such a concert of free peoples as shall bring peace and safety to all nations and make the world itself at last free.—President Wilson.

A SERIOUS PROBLEM NEAR.

The demand is growing even in the highest quarters that this government shall take measures similar to the other governments engaged in war to prevent an extortionate rise in provisions. It has taken such action already in regard to materials for munitions, and let great contracts or made arrangements for making them, at about half the price at which those articles are selling in the open market. Lloyd George called attention to the blunders that the English had been making during the last three years. The greatest of these blunders and the one that would have proved disastrous had not practically the whole world joined in the war was the neglect until the very last moment to secure food supply. The food supply for the population "at prices which it can pay," is just as important as munitions and soldiers.

Plans are on foot to hold a public meeting of Carmel-by-the-Sea property owners to discuss the question of street improvements. As the individual owners must bear the expense of such work, it is desired to ascertain their views of the matter. Date and place of meeting will be announced.

Our Weekly Recipe

BECHAMEL SAUCE.

This is a popular and delicious sauce for fish. To make it, mix together in a saucepan 1½ cups of milk and two tablespoons each of carrot and onion minced, ½ teaspoon of salt, ¼ teaspoon of white pepper, a bayleaf, and a little parsley and thyme. Let this simmer for twenty minutes or so, or until the milk has become well flavored, then strain and set aside to cool. Melt 3 tablespoons of butter and stir into four rounded tablespoons of flour, making a smooth paste. Cook this slowly for a few minutes, being very careful not to allow it to brown; then add the seasoned milk gradually, stirring until it comes to a boil. Lastly add ½ cup of thin cream. Let it cook about two minutes longer, stirring constantly, then serve.
