

TAXPAYERS

All taxpayers are required by the constitution to annually make and deliver to the Assessor a statement, under oath, setting forth specifically ALL the real, personal, or other class of property, owned by such persons, or in their possession, or under their control, as the same stands of record at 12 o'clock Meridian on the first Monday of March

The Political Code provides, that all property must be assessed at its "full cash value," and defines "full cash value" as being "the amount at which the property would be taken in payment of a just debt from a solvent debtor." Unsecured Personal Property

The taxes on all unsecured personal property are due and payable and must be paid at the time the assessment is made.

Exemptions

Any person or association, claiming any property to be exempt from taxation, MUST make the claim and affidavit, for such exemption, every year, in the manner provided by law. This applies to the \$100 allowed on personal property of householders; the \$1000 allowed soldiers, sailors, marines, etc., and property used solely and exclusively for religious worship.

Assessments

Any information desired relating to assessments will be gladly furnished on application, and all objections should be made before the Board of Equalization adjourns, instead of waiting until it is time to pay taxes.

Remember, that if you fail to make a statement you fail to comply with the law and you law yourself liable to arbitrary assessment, which is expensive to yourself and causes much trouble to others. GEO. S. GOULD, Jr.

Notice to California Historical Survey

measures passed by the recent Legislature, and approved by Governor Stephens, and one of especial interest to Carmel, is Senate Bill No. 1021, which reads as follows:

Section 1. Section four of an act entitled "An act to create a commission for the purpose of making a sur-vey of local historical material in the State of California; defining the power and duties of said commission; and making an appropriation therefor," approved June 12, 1915, is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 4. The purpose of this commission shall be to make a survey of the material on local history within the State of California by investigating documents in local depositories and in the possession of private indivinduals and other sources of original information on the early history of the State of California and to compile, keep and publish a record of such sources of information and to investhe physical characteristics of the sev eral missions which were maintained in the State of California under the charge of the Franciscan Fathers prior to the time of the secularization thereof, and to cause to be made a record thereof, and to be created models of the several mission buildings and outbuildings connected therewith, which shall be accurate representations of the mission buildings and outbuildings connected with the same as they were at the time when the Franciscan Fathers were in charge, and the same shall be known respectively as the California Model of each particular mission in question, and the said commission shall cause to be prepared



One of the most important plans and specifications sufficient in detail to enable any of said buildings and outbuildings to be restored, and the commission shall have authority to pass upon and determine the relative accuracy of information to be obtained and to establish for the state the models and plans and specifica-tions thereof; provided, however, that no model shall be established as the no model shall be established as the correct model of any mission unless the said commission shall first have published for a period of at least sixty days a notice to the public fixing a time and place at which any person interested in the said respective mission, or having information as to the condition of said mission buildngs, or any part thereof, may present to the commission facts, papers, documents, records or other information substan-tiotics tiating the said person's ideas as to the condition of said mission buildings at the time in question, which notice must be published in one newspaper in the city of San Francisco, one news paper in the city of Sacramento, one newspaper in the city of Los Angeles, and one newspaper in the county in which said mission building was situated.

> It has been suggested that it would help matters if it was suggested to the public that any person who has information as to the whereabouts of any of the material that was fromerly connected with the Carmel Mission or any of the appliances, would communicate with The Pine Cone.

> If the Commission were able to obtain all local information from one point, its work would be expedited.

A SERIOUS PROBLEM NEAR.

The demand is growing even in the highest quarters that this government shall take measures similar to the other governments engaged in war to prevent an extortionate rise in provisions. It has taken such action already in regard to materials for munitions, and let great contracts or made arrangements for making them, at about half the price at which those articles are selling in the open market. Lloyd George called attention to the blunders that the English had been making during the last three years. The greatest of these blunders and the one that would have proved disastrous had not practically the whole world joined in the war was the neglect until the very last moment to secure food supply. The food supply for the population "at prices which it can pay," is just as important as munitions and soldiers.

Plans are on fooy to hold a public meeting of Carmel-bythe-Sea property owners to discuss the question of street improvements. As the indi-vidual owners must bear the expense of such work, it is desired to ascertain their views of the matter. Date and place of meeting will be announced.

Our Weekly Recipe

BECHAMEL SAUCE.

This is a popular and delicious sauce for fish. To make it, mix together in a saucepan $1\frac{1}{2}$ cups of milk and two tablespoons each of carrot and onion tablespoons each of carrot and onion mineed, $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon of salt, $\frac{1}{4}$ tea-spoon of white pepper, a bayleaf, and a little parsley and thyme. Let this simmer for twenty minutes or so, or until the milk has become well fla-vored, then strain and set aside to cool. Melt 3 tablespoons of butter and stir into four rounded tablespoons of flour, making a smooth paste. Cook this slowly for a few minutes, being very careful not to allow it to brown; then add the seasoned milk gradually, stirring until it comes to a boil. Lastly add $\frac{1}{2}$ cup of thin cream. Let it cook about two minutes longer, stirring constantly, then serve.
