Letter from a French Marquise, who has been a nurse in a military hospital since the beginning of the war.

"Pardon me for my delay in writing, but I have been very busy lately preparing for my departure soon for an ambulance where I shall be busy part of the summer.

"As our hospital at Mentaure has" few wounded at present, one of my friends has asked me to assist her in a service of surgery, which is most interesting. As she assures me I can be very useful, I leave with great joy, after a leave of absence from Mentaure, and permission from my husband. His permission is re-quired now by the Department of Health. As soon as I arrive at my new post I shall write you my impressions and experiences.


"Your compatriots are already at Rouen, charming little persons, very prettily dressed and very military in their aspect for nurses.

"I have just passed six very ag greeable weeks at home. It has been such a long time since I have been able to do so. Consequently my garden is charming I say it without modesty, as of a precious thing I may never see again. You may ask, 'who is to eat all these precious products?' 
