#### PINEAPPLE DELIGHT.

One cupful of chopped pineapple, one tablespoonful of gelatine, two tablespoonfuls of rice, three-quarters tablespoonfuls of rice, three-quarters cupful of sugar, one cupful of whipping cream, two cupfuls of boiling water or of pineapple juice, a pinch of salt, a few preserved cherries. Boil the rice until very soft; then drain it. Dissolve the gelatine in the boiling water; then add the sugar and rice. Cool slightly and add the salt, the pineapple and the whipped cream. Cool and serve in dainty glasses with a cherry on the top of each.

#### BUTTERSCOTCH PIE.

One cupful brown sugar, one heap-One cuprul brown sugar, one neaping tablespoonful butter, and one tablespoonful of flour. Mix like cake, then add yolks of two eggs, one tablespoonful vanilla, one cupful sour cream. Line your pie tin with rich pie crust, fill with above, and bake in a moderate oven. When done, cover with a meringue made of the whites of two eggs and two table-spoonfuls powdered sugar, and return to the oven to brown.
