## ORDINANCE NO. 10

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE USE OF SIDEWALKS IN THE CITY OF CARMEL-BY-THESEA.
THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE CITY OF CARMEL-BY-THESEA DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:
Section 1. It is hereby declared unlawful for any person to ride, drive, or propel any automobile or motor cycle, or to ride or drive any horse, team, mule, cow or like ani mal on, upon or across any sidewalk within the corporate limits of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea, excepting at stret crossings or over permanent driveways.
Section 2. Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine net exceeding $\$ 50.00$ or by imprisonment in the County Jail of Monterey County not exceeding ten days, or by both such fine and imprisonment The judgment imposing the fine may provide for its collection by impris orment at the rate of one day for each $\$ 2.00$ of the fine.

Any person owning or having charge, care or control of any dog who shall permit or allow the same to run at large on any street, lane, alley, park or other public place within the corporate limits of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea, unless such dog shall be registered and shal! have a collar attached thereon on which there shall be a tag inscribed as in this ordinance, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine not exceeding $\$ 25.00$. The rice may be cooked as usual, though it is improved if boiled in chicken or veal stock instead of water. While the rice cooks, drain the liquid from half a can of tomatues. To this add one-fourth of a small onion and seasoning of parsley, salt and pepper. Cook gently about twenty minutes and press through the sieve. Add the cooked rice and one
beaten egg, two tablespoonfuls of grated cheese and one tablespoonful of butter. When well mixed, spread (1) a patter until cold, then cut in sections and shape into balls. Roll in rumbs and fry in hot fat.
