ORDINANCE NO. 10

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE USE OF SIDEWALKS IN THE CITY OF CARMEL-BY-THE-SEA.

THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE CITY OF CARMEL-BY-THE-SEA DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. It is hereby declared unlawful for any person to ride, drive, or propel any automobile or motor cycle, or to ride or drive any horse, team, mule, cow or like animal on, upon or across any sidewalk within the corporate limits of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea, excepting at street crossings or over permanent driveways.

Section 2. Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine not exceeding \$50.00 or by imprisonment in the County Jail of Monterey County not exceeding ten days, or by both such fine and imprisonment. The judgment imposing the fine may provide for its collection by imprisonment at the rate of one day for each \$2.00 of the fine.

ORDINANCE NO. 15

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION NO. 4 OF ORDINANCE NO. 8 OF THE CITY OF CARMEL-BY-THE-SEA, ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO THE DISCHARGE OF FIREARMS, THE USE OF CERTAIN WEAPONS, AND THE EXPLOSION OF FIRE-CRACKERS, ROMAN CANDLES, SKY ROCKETS AND LIKE ARTICLES, THE KINDLING OF BON FIRES OR CAMP FIRES WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF THE CITY OF CARMEL-BY-THE-SEA," PASSED AND ADOPTED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE CITY OF CARMEL-BY-THE-SEA ON THE 6TH DAY OF FEBRUARY, 1917.

THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE CITY OF CARMEL-BY-THE-SEA DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Section 4 of Ordinance No. 8 of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea, entitled "An Ordinance Relating to the Discharging of Firearms, the use of Certain Weapons, and the Explosion of Fire-Crackers, Roman Candles, Sky Rockets and Like Articles, the Kindling of Bon Fires or Camp Fires within the City Limits of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea," passed and adopted by the Board of Trustees of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea on the 6th day of February, 1917, is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 4. It shall be permissible to build Bon Fires, and to explode, fire off or discharge Fire-Crackers, Roman Candles, Sky Rockets, Squibs and other Fire-Works on the sea beach or on the sand dunes which slope facing the sea within the corporate limits of said city.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force thirty days from and after its final passage and approval.

PASSED AND ADOPTED by the Board of Trustees of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea this 7th day of Aug., A. D. 1917, by the following vote:

ORDINANCE NO. 16

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION NO. 8 OF ORDINANCE NO. 12 ENTITLED, "AN ORDINANCE FOR THE LICENSING, REGISTRATION AND IMPOUNDING OF DOGS IN THE CITY OF CARMEL-BY-THE-SEA, AND PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS THEREOF," PASSED AND ADOPTED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE CITY OF CARMEL-BY-THE-SEA ON THE 3RD DAY OF APRIL, 1917.

THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE CITY OF CARMEL-BY-THE-SEA DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Section 8 of Ordinance No. 12 of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea, entitled, "An Ordinance Providing for the Licensing, Registration and Impounding of Dogs in the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea, and Providing Penalties for Violations thereof," passed and adopted by the Board of Trustees of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea on the 3rd day of April, 1917, is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 8. Any person owning or having charge, care or control of any dog who shall permit or allow the same to run at large on any street, lane, alley, park or other public place within the corporate limits of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea, unless such dog shall be registered and shall have a collar attached thereon on which there shall be a tag inscribed as in this ordinance, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine not exceeding \$25.00. The judgment imposing such fine may provide for its collection by imprisonment in the County Jail of Monterey County, California, for the time, at the rate and in the manner provided by law.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force thirty (30) days from and after its final passage and approval.

By order of the postmaster general, letters, postcards and printed matter mailed in the United States for transmission to the United States expeditionary forces in Europe will be accepted at ordinary domestic postage rates.

All such matter should bear the complete designation of the division regiment, company and organization to which the addressee belongs, as well as the name and address of the sender.

Patrons should under no circumstances attempt to designate on the envelope the place where the troops are located.

The correct manner of addressing such a letter is shown below:

Our Weekly Recipe RICE BOULETTES.

Rice boulettes offer an attractive way of serving the cereal with fish or meat. The rice may be cooked as usual, though it is improved if boiled in chicken or veal stock instead of water. While the rice cooks, drain the liquid from half a can of tomatoes. To this add one-fourth of a small onion and seasoning of parsley, salt and pepper. Cook gently about twenty minutes and press through the sieve. Add the cooked rice and one beaten egg, two tablespoonfuls of grated cheese and one tablespoonful of butter. When well mixed, spread on a patty until cold, then cut in sections and shape into balls. Roll in crumbs and fry in hot fat.
