When cold place carefully on a large plate and spread with a thin layer of raspberry or strawberry jam, put on a second cake, spread with jam and pile up other layers in the same way. Sprinkle with powdered sugar.

## Motor Trucks for Farmers

In States which have built permanent highways, the use of motor trucks by farmers is on the increase. Farmers find that by owning the powerful trucks, a load can be hauled as easily on one truck as formerly was handled by three twohorse wagons. The motor truck promises to revolutionize the haul for the man who raises crops. In the days of the past, the grain was hauled on wagons to the nearest elevator. Railroad trains then assumed the haul to the central markets. But, with the construction of hard-surfaced roads, the farmer with the motor truck is able to do his own hauling for a distance of 100 miles or even longer if he inoses, taking his products direct to mill. In other words, the farmer proposes to act independently of the steam railroads. Probably he can make a carrying rate much less than the tariffs of the railroads. The motor car promises to be dis finct aid to the farmer. The good road makes it possible. Farmers are familiar with the outlook and will be found to be the strongést supporters of the good roads movement, which is developing a demand for hard pavements through rural sections. And a reduction in the cost of marketing roducts from the farm should eventually give the consumer in the city the advantage of lower food prices.

Yesterday, being "Liberty Day," the school had a "rainy day session and the Postoffice maintained Sunday hours. In the afternoon there was a liberty tea and sale for the benefit of the Red Cross.

Throw pipe asbes and cigarette aud cigar stumps in the dinst of the road, and stamp out the fire. Do not throw them into needles, leaves or brush.

## Making Camp

Make a small camp fire. Huild it iu the open - not against a tree or $\log$ or near brush. Scrape away anything burnable near it.

Leaving Camp
Never leave a camp fire aloue, even for a brief time, withont pouring water upon it and then covering it with earth. See 1914 hunt. ing license.

## Bonfires

Dr, not make bonfires when it is windy, or when or where there is the least danger of gettiug beyoud control. Avoid making a targer fire thin neeenstry.

## Fighting Fire

If you discover is fire, endeavor to put it out. If you cannot, get word of it to the nearest federal or state fire warden quickly Information
Keep in tnuch with the rangerAscertain the tumber of the district in which yon are camping from United States forest riryeis, cominty clerks or newspaper offices. Wake a note of it on a card or memorandum book.
