### Our Weekly Recipe

#### WASHINGTON CAKE

For the batter, beat one-half cup butter to a cream with two-cupfuls of sugar, add three beaten eggs, one cupful of milk, and three cupfuls of flour sifted with three teaspoonfuls of baking powder.

Spread the mixture in five shallow baking tins, and bake in a moderate oven about 15 minutes. Let the cake cool before removing from the pan.

When cold place carefully on a large plate and spread with a thin layer of raspberry or strawberry jam, put on a second cake, spread with jam and pile up other layers in the same way. Sprinkle with powdered sugar.

## Motor Trucks for Farmers

In States which have built permanent highways, the use of motor trucks by farmers is on the increase. Farmers find that by owning the powerful trucks, a load can be hauled as easily on one truck as formerly was handled by three two-horse wagons. The motor truck promises to revolutionize the haul for the man who raises crops. In the days of the past, the grain was hauled on wagons to the nearest elevator. Railroad trains then assumed the haul to the central markets. But, with the construction of hard-surfaced roads, the farmer with the motor truck is able to do his own hauling for a distance of 100 miles or even longer if he chooses, taking his products direct to mill. In other words, the farmer proposes to act independently of the steam railroads. Probably he can make a carrying rate much less than the tariffs of the railroads. The motor car promises to be distinct aid to the farmer. The good road makes it possible. Farmers are familiar with the outlook and will be found to be the strongest supporters of the good roads movement, which is developing a demand for hard pavements through rural sections. And a reduction in the cost of marketing products from the farm should eventually give the consumer in the city the advantage of lower food prices.

Yesterday, being "Liberty Day," the school had a "rainy day session" and the Postoffice maintained Sunday hours. In the afternoon there was a liberty tea and sale for the benefit of the Red Cross.

Just pay for all the fine advertising given in such case and the editor will plunk up the spondulix for several tickets to any show that is pulled off. Most editors are glad to boost shows, etc., especially home affairs, and a complimentary ticket or two doesn't begin to pay him for his space and it's the newspaper boosting every time that brings out the crowd.

No editors are not "moochers" They are only getting half pay for this kind of business at best, but don't be "finicky" about the half pay if the editor is willing to accept, and he usually is—in home matters always.—Lincoln Messenger.

The empire-builder and the author were together at headquarters, and the soldiers, having learned of their presence, assembled around the distinguished men's tent and raised a mighty cheer.

Rhodes and Kipling stepped out to see what the excitement was about, and the cheering redoubled. "Take off your cap, they are cheering you!" said Rhodes to Kipling. Said Kipling to Rhodes, "No, they are not; they are cheering you." "They are cheering both of you," suggested General Younghusband. Whereupon both men, standing close together for support, shyly removed their hats.

### WORDS AND THEIR ORIGIN

The word "school" is derived from the Greek word "schole," meaning leisure, because, in former days, when people worked hard in the fields throughout the day, they could only learn in leisure hours.

"Sincere" comes from the Latin "sincere cera," without wax. The Romans were fond of filling up cracks in vases with wax, in order to make them appear perfect.

The word "salary" has an interesting origin. When a Roman Governor used to tour through the provinces he administered, the people had to provide him with food for his horses and salt for himself. The latter was his "salarium"—from Latin "sal," meaning "salt."

A photograph is the result of the "writing of the sun's rays, on specially prepared films. "Photo" refers to light, and "grapho" means "I write."

The word "alphabet" is made by combining "alpha" and "beta," the names of the first two letters of the Greek alphabet. "Omega" is the name of the last letter.

"Good-by" comes from "God-be-with-you," just as "Adieu" means "to God."

### School Authority to Visit Carmel

An important event in the history of the schools of Monterey county is the tour of inspection of the State Commissioner of Elementary Education, Dr. Margaret S. McNaught.

Seventy schools will be visited and ten or more lectures on progressive education will be given.

Dr. McNaught will visit the Carmel school early next month, and it is the evening it is planned to have her lecture here under the auspices of the Arts and Crafts club.

The trustees, teacher and pupils of the Bay school, down the Coast, will be asked to attend here.

## Guard Against Fire in the Forest

### Matches

Be sure your match is out before throwing it on the ground. Break it in two.

### Tobacco

Throw pipe ashes and cigarette and cigar stumps in the dust of the road, and stamp out the fire. Do not throw them into needles, leaves or brush.

### Making Camp

Make a small camp fire. Build it in the open — not against a tree or log or near brush. Scrape away anything burnable near it.

### Leaving Camp

Never leave a camp fire alone, even for a brief time, without pouring water upon it and then covering it with earth. See 1914 hunting license.

### Bonfires

Do not make bonfires when it is windy, or when or where there is the least danger of getting beyond control. Avoid making a larger fire than necessary.

### Fighting Fire

If you discover a fire, endeavor to put it out. If you cannot, get word of it to the nearest federal or state fire warden quickly.

### Information

Keep in touch with the rangers. Ascertain the number of the district in which you are camping from United States forest rangers, county clerks or newspaper offices. Make a note of it on a card or memorandum book.
