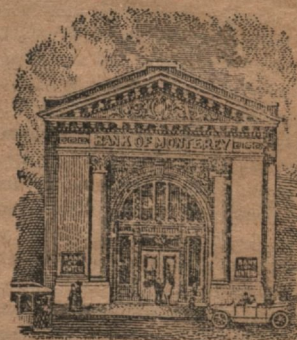

ORDINANCE NO. 18

AN ORDINANCE CREATING AND ORGANIZING AND PROVIDING FOR A BOARD OF HEALTH AND FOR THE APPOINTMENT OF A HEALTH OFFICER IN AND FOR THE CITY OF CARMEL-BY-THE-SEA, AND DEFINING THE POWERS AND DUTIES OF SUCH BOARD.

THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE CITY OF CARMEL-BY-THE-SEA DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. There is hereby created a Board of Health in and for the said city. Said Board shall consist of five members, one of whom shall be a regularly licensed physician and a graduate of some reputable school of medicine; and one, if practicable, a civil engineer. The members of the Board shall hold their offices at the pleasure of the Board of Trustees and shall serve without compensation.

Section 2. The Board of Health shall organize by electing one of its members President and one of its members as Secretary of said Board. The Board shall hold its meetings in the City Hall in said city. The Board shall provide the manner in which meetings shall be called and held, and regular and special meetings of the Board shall be open to the public.

Section 3.—The Marshal of said city shall be the executive officer of said Board of Health and shall be officio Health Officer of said city.

Section 4.—Three members of the Board of Health shall constitute a quorum, and the affirmative vote of three members shall be necessary to pass any measure, but a less number may adjourn from day to day and compel the attendance of absent members in such manner as the Board may prescribe. The Board shall adopt its own rules of procedure.

Section 5.—It shall be the duty of the Board of Health to advise the Health Officer in all matters affecting the public health and the sanitary condition of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea; to recommend to the Board of Trustees such sanitary measures as, in its judgment, ought to be adopted, and to aid, advise and counsel the Health Officer in carrying out the provisions of all ordinances relating to the public health. It shall have supervision of all matters pertaining to the sanitary condition of said city, and may make such rules and regulations relating thereto as are necessary and proper and not contrary to law. Whenever circumstances require, it shall declare by resolution what measures it deems necessary for the control of contagious and infectious diseases and recommend appropriate legislation to the Board of Trustees, and recommend the adoption and enforcement of such rules and regulations as it may deem necessary for the establishment of quarantine of such cases. It shall perform such other duties as may be required by any of the laws of the State of California.

Section 6.—The Board of Health shall submit, when required, in

writing to the Board of Trustees of said city a report of its official actions, and, if required by the Board of Trustees, shall submit in writing an accurate estimate of the amount of money required from the city for the administration of the health department of said city.

Section 7.—This ordinance is hereby declared to be urgent and necessary to immediately preserve the public health and safety, and shall take effect and be in force from and after its final passage and adopt on.

Camouflage

The word incorporated itself into the world's varied vocabulary when the French began painting shields for their batteries to imitate the scenery in the vicinity; it fooled the aviators of the enemy.

The older and more general French use of the word is to indicate most any sort of deceit or "faking" whereby an illusion or false impression is served.

The word has come to America at a time when it serves admirably to describe the practices of certain elements of this country's population.

We have here, for instance, German propaganda distributors, camouflaging as "peace" societies.

There are cowards suddenly prompted to camouflage as "conscientious objectors."

There are vandals and riotors in the service of the Kaiser camouflaging as the friends of labor.

There are mis-representatives in Congress, moved by pro-Germanism, who give aid to the enemy while camouflaging as "defenders of the Constitution."

There are preachers and editors who proclaim and print disloyalty and sedition, discredit the purposes of the nation, and ridicule the President while camouflaging as "reflectors of public opinion."

This war has to be fought to a finish. Loyalists be on your guard. This camouflage business must not be permitted to mislead the American people.

Our Weekly Recipe

Meat and Pastry Rolls

Small quantity of cold ham, chicken or other meat may be utilized for these. The meat should be chopped fine, well seasoned, mixed with enough savory fat or butter to make it "shape," and form into rolls about the size of a finger. A short dough (made say of a pint of flour, 2 tablespoonsful of lard, 1 teaspoonful of baking powder, salt, and milk enough to mix) should be rolled thin, cut into strips and folded about the meat rolls, care being taken to keep the shape regular. The rolls should be baked in a quick oven until they are a delicate brown color and served hot.

Have You Signed the Hoover Pledge?

SACRAMENTO, Oct. 29.—An appeal to the men and women of the State "as Americans, as Californians, and as lovers of your Nation and of humanity" to sign the food pledge was made today by Governor Wm. D. Stephens.

The proclamation reads:

"Urged by my sense of patriotic duty to support every effort toward the Nation's victory in the struggle now being waged on land and sea, I appeal to the women and the men of California to at once sign the food pledge of the Federal Food Administration.

"These pledges will be presented at every door, they will appear in the newspapers, they will be spoken of in the churches, theatres and moving-picture house. Every agency—Federal, State, county, municipal, public and private, will be used to bring these pledges to your notice. Every woman and every man in California should sign.

"The pledge is a simple one.

It merely states that the signer is glad to join the Federal administration in the service of food conservation of our Nation and that the signer accepts membership in the United States Food Administration, pledging herself or himself to carry out the directions and advice of the food administrator in the home, so far as circumstances permit. "Unity of American homes arrayed against the enemy will mean certain success."
