## ORDINANCE NO. 18

A N ORDINANCE CREATING AND ORGANIZING AND PROVIDING FOR A BOARD OF HEALTH AND FOR THE APPOINTMENT OF A HEALTH OFFICER IN AND FOR THE GITY OF CARMEI-BY-THE-SEA, AND DEFINING THE POWERS AND DUTIES OF SUCH BOARD.
THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE CITY OF CARMEL-BY-THESEA DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:
Section 1 . There is hereby created a Board of Health in and for the said city. Said Board shall consist of five members, one of whom shall be a regularly licensed physician and a gradrate of some reputable sehool of medicine; and one, if practicable, a civil engineer. The members of the Board shall hold their offices at the pleasure of the Board of 'Tru-tees and shall serve without compensation.
Section 2. The Board of Health shall organize by electing one of its members President and one of its members as Secretary of said Board. The Board shall hoid its meetings in the City Hail in said city. The Board shall provide the manner in which meetings shall be called and held, and regular and special meetings of the Board shall be open to the public.
Section 3.-The Marshal of said city shail be the executive officer of said Board of Health and shall be exofficio Health Officer of said city.
Section 4.-Three members of the Board of Health shnll constitute a quorum, and the affirmative vote of three members shall be necessary to pass any measure, but a less number may adjourn from day to day and compel the attendance of absent members in such manner as the Board may prescribe. The Board shall adopt its own rules of procedure.

Section 5. - It shall be the duty of the Board of Health to advise the Health Offieer in all matters affeeting the public health and the sanitary condition of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea; to recommend to the Board of Trustees such sanitary measures as, in its judgment, ought to be adopted, and to aid, advise and counsel the Health Officer in carrying out the provisions of all ordinances relating to the public health. It shall have supervision of all matters pertaining to the sanitary condition of said city, and may make such rules and regulations relating thereto as are necessary and proper and not contrary to law. Whenever circumstances require, it shall declare by resolution what measures it deems necessary for the control of contagious and infectious diseases and recommend appropriate legislation to the Board of Trustees, and recommend the adoption and enforcement of such rules and regulations as it may deem necessary for the establishment of quarantine of such cases. It shall perform such other duties as may be required by any of the lsws of the State of California. Section 6.-The Board of Health

There are preachers and tditors who proclain and print disloyalty and sedition, discredit the purposes of the nation, and ridicule the President while camouflaging as "reflectors of public opinion."
This war has to be fought to a fiuish. Loyalists be on your guard. This camouflage business must not be permitted to mislead the American people.

## Our Weekly Recipe

Meat and Pastry Rolls
mall quantity of cold ham, chick en or other meat may be utilized for these. The meat should be chopped fine, well seasoned, mixed with enough savory fat or butter to make it "shape," and form into rolls about the size of a finger. A short dough (made say of a pint of flour, 2 tablespoonsful of lard, 1 teaspoonf $u$ l of baking powder, salt, and milk enough to mix) should be rolled thin. cut into strips and folded about the meat rolls, care being taken to keep the shape regular. The rolls should be baked in a quick oven until they ve a delicate brown color and served hot.
