Governor William Dennison Stephens has issued the following Thanksgiving proclamation:

"The President has by proclamation set apart Thursday, the 29th day of November, 1917, as Thanksgiving Day, and has urged that on that day we lay aside our appointed tasks to give thanks to Almighty God for the blessings He has bestowed upon us.

"In the State of California we have a multitude of things to be thankful for. On account of a generous season, our crops have been overwhelmingly bountiful. The resources of our banks are greater than ever before. The average individual is earning more money than he has for years. We owe thanks for the spirit of patriotism and self-sacrifice which the people of this State have shown in meeting the problems imposed by the war. That is the spirit which gave strength to the men of Lexington and Valley Forge, and is the spirit which has built this nation into one of the great powers of the earth. ORDINANCE NO. 18

A N ORDINANCE CREATING AND ORGANIZING AND PROVIDING FOR A BOARD OF HEALTH AND FOR THE APPOINTMENT OF A HEALTH OFFICER IN AND FOR THE CITY OF CARMEL-BY-THE-SEA, AND DEFINING THE POWERS AND DUTIES OF SUCH BOARD.

THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE CITY OF CARMEL-BY-THE-SEA DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. There is hereby created a Board of Health in and for the said city. Said Board shall consist of five members, one of whom shall be a regularly licensed physician and a graduate of some reputable school of medicine; and one, if practicable, a civil engineer. The members of the Board shall hold their offices at the pleasure of the Board of Trustees and shall serve without compensation.

Section 2. The Board of Health shall organize by electing one of its members President and one of its members as Secretary of said Board. The Board shall hold its meetings in the City Hall in said city. The Board shall provide the manner in which meetings shall be called and held, and regular and special meetings of the Board shall be open to the public.

Section 3.—The Marshal of said city shall be the executive officer of said Board of Health and shall be ex-officio Health Officer of said city.

Section 4.—Three members of the Board of Health shall constitute a quorum, and the affirmative vote of three members shall be necessary to pass any measure, but a less number may adjourn from day to day and compel the attendance of absent members in such manner as the Board may prescribe. The Board shall adopt its own rules of procedure.

Section 5.—It shall be the duty of the Board of Health to advise the Health Officer in all matters affecting the public health and the sanitary condition of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea; to recommend to the Board of Trustees such sanitary measures as, in its judgment, ought to be adopted, and to aid, advise and counsel the Health Officer in carrying out the provisions of all ordinances relating to the public health. It shall have supervision of all matters pertaining to the sanitary condition of said city, and may make such rules and regulations relating thereto as are necessary and proper and not contrary to law. Whenever circumstances require, it shall declare by resolution what measures it deems necessary for the control of contagious and infectious diseases and recommend appropriate legislation to the Board of Trustees, and recommend the adoption and enforcement of such rules and regulations as it may deem necessary for the establishment of quarantine of such cases. It shall perform such other duties as may be required by any of the laws of the State of California.

Section 6.—The Board of Health shall submit, when required, in

writing to the Board of Trustees of said city a report of its official actions, and, if required by the Board of Trustees, shall submit in writing an accurate estimate of the amount of money required from the city for the administration of the health department of said city.

Section 7.—This ordinance is hereby declared to be urgent and necessary to immediately preserve the public health and safety, and shall take effect and be in force from and after its final passage and adoption.

A Change for the Better

That there will be fewer than ever of the old-time holiday gift books this season is indicated by the publications that have already appeared.

Years ago the typical "gift book," printed on ornately decorated paper, with full-page color illustrations, elaborately bound, and "boxed" in a way that gave it the appearance of a toothsome package of confectionery, was very much in evidence.

People inflicted these gift books on their friends not because of a suspected literary value in the books themselves, but primarily because the latter were outwardly festive and "Christmasy."

But the war seems to have sounded the death-knell of this odd literary harlequin—and of all the changes that the war has brought about in the world of books this change may be least deplored.

And now that the sugary gift book of the past has disappeared, its place is being more than filled by books that are really worth while, books whose appeal is based on the printed page and not on decoration and fanciful binding. The new gift book is something that deserves a hearty welcome this year—and there is every indication that the welcome will be ungrudgingly accorded.—New York Times.

Our Weekly Recipe

Fig Pudding

Four ounces flour, four ounces bread crumbs, four ounces suet, four ounces sugar (brown is cheaper than granulated and does not require so much for sweetening), four ounces figs, one teaspoonful baking powder, one egg, a little milk, a pinch of salt. Chop figs up rather small and mix all the dry ingredients together, then add the beaten egg and enough milk to make it the right consistency. Put into a ground pudding mold, cover with greased paper and a scalded and floured cloth, steam for two hours and serve with a plain white pudding sauce or a lemon syrup.

The Right of Authors to Reply to Critics

Giving it as his deliberate opinion that an author ought to be allowed to a misrepresenting review, William Dean Howells has written:

"In any other relation of life, the man who thinks himself wronged tries to right himself, violently, if he is a mistaken man, and lawfully, if he is a wise man or a rich one, which is practically the same thing.

"But the author, dramatist, painter, sculptor, whose book, play, picture, statue has been unfairly dealt with, must make no effort to right himself with the public; he must bear his wrong in silence; he is even expected to grin and bear it as if it were funny. Everybody understands that it is not funny to him, not in the least funny, but everybody says that he cannot make an effort to get the public to take his point of view without loss of dignity.

"This is very odd but it is the fact, and I suppose it comes from the feeling that the author, dramatist, painter, sculptor has already said the best he can of his side in his book, play, picture, statue. This is partly true and yet if he wishes to add something more to prove the critic wrong, we do not see how his attempt to do so should involve loss of dignity. The public, which is so jealous for his dignity, does not otherwise use him as if he were a very great or invaluable creature.

"I should say that he lost dignity or not as he behaved, in his effort to right himself. . . . If he betrayed a wounded vanity, if he impugned the motives and accused the lives of his critics, I should certainly feel that he was losing dignity; but if he temperately examined their theories, and
