Many Things To Be Thankful For


Governor William Dennison Stephens has issued the following Thanksgiving proclamatiou :



A N ORDINANCE CREATING ANDORGANIZIN ; AND PROVID-ING FOR A BOARD OF HEALTH AND FOR THE APPOINTMENT OF A HEALTH OFFICER IN AND FOR THE CITY OF CARMEL-BY-THE-SEA, AND DEFINING THE POWERS AND DUTIES OF SUCH BOARD.

THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE CITY OF CARMEL-BY-THE-SEA DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. There is hereby created said city. Said Board shall consist of five members, one of whom shall be a regularly licensed physician and a graduate of some reputable school of medicine; and one, if practicable, a civil engineer. The members of the Board shall hold their offices at the pleasure of the Board of Tru-tees and shall serve without compensation.

Section 2. The Board of Health shall organize by electing one of its members President and one of its members as Secretary of said Board. The Board shall hold its meetings in the City Hall in said city. The Board shall provide the manner in which meetings shall be called and held, and regular and special meetings of the Board shall be open to the public.

Section 3 .- The Ma shal of said city shall be the executive officer of said Board of Health and shall be exofficio Health Officer of said city.

Section 4.-Three members of the Board of Health shall constitute a quorum, and the affirmative vote of three members shall be necessary to pass any measure, but a less number may adjourn from day to day and compel the attendance of absent members in such manner as the

Section 5. - It shall be the duty of All the Board of Health to advise the Health Officer in all matters affecting the public health and the san tary condition of the City of Carmelby-the-Sea; to recommend to the measures as, in its judgment, ought to be adopted, and to aid, advise and counsel the Health Officer in carrying out the provisions of all ordinances relating to the public health. It shall have supervision of all matters pertaining to the sanitary condition of said city, and may make such rules and regulations relating thereto as are necessary and proper and not contrary to law. Whenever circumstances require, it shall declare by resolution what measures it deems necessary for the control of contagious and infectious diseases and recommend appropriate legislation to the Board of Trustees, and recommend the adoption and enforcement of such rules and regulations as it may deem necessary for the establishment of quarantine of such cases. It shall perform such • her duties as may be required by any of the laws of the State of California. Section 6. - The Board of Health shall submit, when required; in

Years ago the typical "gift book," printed on ornately decorated paper, with full-page color illustrations, elaborately bound,. and "boxed" in a way that gave it the appearance of a toothsome package of confectionery, was very much in evidence.

People inflicted these gift books on their friends not because of a suspected literary value in the books themselves, but primarily because the latler were outwardly festive and 'Christmasy."

But the war seems to have sounded the death-knell of this odd literary harlequin -and of all the changes that the ar has brought about in the world of books this change may be least deplored.

And now that the sugary gift book of the past has disappeared, its place is being more than filled by books that are really worth while, books whose appeal is based an the printed page and not on decoration and fanciful binding. The new gift book is something that deserves a hearty welcome this year-and there is every indication that the welcome will be ungrudgingly accorded.-New York Times.

Our Weekly Recipe

Fig Pudding

Four cunces flour, four ounces bread crumbs, four ounces suet, four ounces sugar (brown is cheaper than cranulated and does not require so much for sweetening). four ounces figs, one teaspoonful baking powder, one egg, a little milk, a pinch of salt. Chop figs up rather small and mix all the dry ingredients together, then add the beaten egg and enough milk to make it the right consistency. Put into a ground pudding mold, cover with greased paper and a scalded and floured cloth, steam for two hours and serve with a plain white pudding sauce or a lemon eyrup. granulated and does not require so pudding sauce or a lemon syrup.
