THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE CITY OF CARMEL-BY-THESEA DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. There is hereby created a Board of Health in and for the said city. Said Board shall consist of five members, one of whom shall be a regulariy licensed physician and a gradnate of some reputable school of medicine; and one, if practicable, a civil engineer. The members of the Board shall hold their offices at the pleasure of th-Board of Tru-tees and shall serve without compensation.
Section 2. The Board of Health shall organize by electing one of its members President and one of its members as Secretary of said Hoard. The Board shall hold its meetings in the City Hall in said city. The Board shall provide the manner in which meetings shall be called and held, and regular and special meetings of the Board shall be open to the public.
Section 3.-The Ma shal of said city shall be the executive officer of said Board of Health and shall be exofficio Health Officer of said city.

Section 4. Three members of the Board of Health shall constitute a quorum, and the affirmative vote of three members shall be necessary to pass any measure, but a less number may adjourn from day to day and compel the attendance of absent members in such manner as the Board may prescribe. The Board shall adopt its own rules of procedure.
Section 5. - It shall be the duty of the Board of Health to advise the Health Officer in all matters affecting the public health and the santary coudition of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea; to recommend to the Board of Trustees such sanitary measures as, in its jucgment, ought to be adopted, and to aid, advise and counsel the Health Officer in carrying out the provisions of all ordinances relating to the public heaith. It shall have supervision of all matters pertaining to the sanitary condition of said city, bnd may make such rules and regulations relating thereto as are necessary and proper aud not cintrary to law. Whenever circumstances require, it shall dt clare by resolution what measures it deems necessary for the control of contagious and infectious diseases and recommend appropriate legislation to the Buard of Trustees, and recommend the adoption and enforcement of such rules and regulations as it may deem necessary for the establishment of quaramine of such cases. It shall perform such - her
duties as may be reguired the laws of the State of California. Seetion 6. The Board of Heaith shall submit, when required; in

## Fig Pudding

Four cunces flour, four ounces read crumbs, four ounces suet, four ounces sugar (brown is cheaper than granulated and does not require so much for sweetening). four ounces figs, one teaspoonful baking powder, one egrg, a little milk, a pinch of salt. Chop figs up rather small and mix all the dry ingredients together, then add the beaten egg and enough milk to make it the right consistency. Put into a ground pudding mold, cover with greased paper and a scalded fnd floured cloth, steam for two hours and serve with a plain white pudding sauce or a lemon syrup.

This is partly true and y H if he wishes to add something more to prove the critic wrong, we do tot see how his attempt to do so should iinvolve loss of dignity. The pub. lic, which is so jralous for his dig nitr, does not otherwise use him as if he were a very great or invalu able creature
