## Airplanes After the War

It is not known how far the commercial development of the airplane would have proceeded by now if the work of inventors and builders had not been concentrated on military demands.

Some conceptiom of what might have been accomplished may be had from instances of us is to which the air ship has been put as a carrier.

For example, the Italians send supplies to Sardinia, aud the French to Corsica, by air, to escape the submarine peril. Machines carrying 10 to 20 person, with baggage, travel from London to Rome.

These things afford an idea of what the possibilities are for air traffic when men turn to constructive efforis in aviation.

Our own government has begurı to look forward in this matter by the creation of an aerial transport committee. Not long ago it was announced the air mail routes would be established between the islands off the American coast.

We shall see at the end of the war some rapid strides in the commercial development of the airplane.

## Interesting Letter

## From Herbett Hand

A Sonth Amaricau Purt, November 19, 1917.

## Mr. W. L. Overstreet,

Editor, Carmel Pine Cone
My dear sir:
i wrote jou kot long ago that as snon as the order allowing us to write of our trip was posted I whoth sembly yon necount of it.
We left San Diego, Califoruia, at 4 p.m., May 7. accompabied by the South Dakota, Pueblo, and Frederick, and stood south, making 18 kuots. Met coilier Nanshas ou Miny 10 , aud sent mail back to the States by her. Mat strange ressel ou May 11 aud dispatehed the Frederick to run her down and invertignte; nothing unustual commercial vessel.
The Pueblo broke battle formation on May 12 and proceeded ahead to Purama City. The other ressels cloanged their conrse and arrived at San Jose del Sorr, Guatemala, on May 13. The Admiral and staff went ashore and paill re spects to Guatemala's President the following day. We departed
for Balloon, Camal Zone on Mav 17 for Balloo, Caual Zone on May 17 and arrived there on the 20th.
The Pitisburgh anchored inside the Canal; the other slinps tied up at the docks. Left Balboa and Panama City on the $2 t$ th aud ar rived at Cristobal and Colon ou the same day.
The trip throngh the Cinal was interesting. We took on coal by motern machiutery, and left Colou for somewhere, and reached Babia, Brazil, June 14 (cross the line June 10) and had a big, time. Left Bahia on June 20, and reached Rio de Janeiro on the 22d. Many salutes trere fired in welcome to us. Rio is a beantiful city ; there was a splendid parade there on July Fourth, four nations being represented.
Wo departed for Montevidio. Uruguay, on July IO. We came iuside amidst the whatling of many tuys and thousands of clieers from thousatuds of throats-and hearts. They cheered and cheered us untif we cut loose and cheered them in return. Never was a na tiou more wonderfully received thau we were; bad a grand time. Left for Buenos dires on July 23 , arriving next day; big crowd; mo welcome; fine time later made up for it-danciug, pienies, rides, ete. Left July 21 and made our way dovu the River De Plata to the open sea.
I have had to omit mneh that would be of ivterest. We're at wir: you mud-rstand.
