Joe Hitchcock came down from Oakland on Monday to bid his folks goodbye, prior to his departure for San Antonio to join the aviation service.

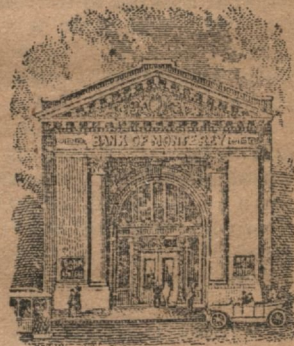
Mrs. F. J. Rogers and son John were here this week from San Jose. They motored from San Jose with City Manager T. H. Reed and family.

## Trustees Discuss City Betterment

With all its members present, this year's first meeting of the Carmel Board of Trustees was held on Wednesday evening of last week.

A gratifying report was that of Taxcollector Englund. The amount of city taxes collected shows a delinquency of only 14 per cent. A good record for the first year under incorporation.

Only a short time was taken up in disposing of the routine business, after which there was a general discussion of plans for city betterment.

There is a feeling that the matter of providing better streets and roadways within the corporation must be gone through with, and in this connection there is an evident desire on the part of the entire board to include much-needed sewer construction.

It is probable that a new method of making and equalizing realty valuations will be adopted this year. To put it plainly, the present assessed valuations are too low. No one owning lots in Carmel would think of disposing of them at anywhere near their present assessed valuation. Therefore, it would appear that the thing to do is to increase the valuation and reduce the rate.

The State Housing Act has numerous requirements for the safeguarding of life and property, which the trustees will be obliged to enforce.

## Provisions of the Rominger Bill

In response to the requests of several subscribers, the Pine Cone herewith presents a concise statement of the provisions of the Rominger bill, to be voted on next November.

The proposed measure abolishes the saloon and barroom wherever located, prevents the sale of such drinks as whisky, brandy and gin for beverage purposes, allows hotels, restaurants and clubs to serve fermented liquors, such as beer and light dry wines at the table, in sealed packages with a bona fide meal.

These fermented liquors can be served only in a public room or public place, no booths or boxes being permitted. Alcoholic contents is limited to 14 per cent. No bottled cocktails or sweet wines or other liquors containing distilled spirits are allowed.

Sale is limited to the hours between noon and midnight. The vinous and malt liquors may be served in one's home.

Those portions of the State that are now dry will remain so in the event that the measure is adopted.

### State License Required

J. W. Hand, Mrs. R. J. De Yoe, and the Carmel Development Co. have taken out their realty dealers' license.

No person, firm or corporation buying, selling, leasing, renting property other than their own, can, under the new law, engage in this business unless they have this license.

A heavy penalty is provided for the violation of any of the provisions of this act of the last Legislature.
