Millions of Ties Will be Hauled On Coast Road

A deal involving \$2,000,000, covering a contract to supply railroad ties and split lumber, to be hauled over the Coast road from the Big Sur section, is reported to have been consumated.

Sam Trotter, a representa-tive of the contractors, esti-mates that \$5000 will put the road in shape for hauling this immense quantity of material, and has made an offer to the Supervisors to pay 40 per cent of the cost. Therefore, the Board of Supervisors has made an order directing surveyor Cozzins to inspect the road and submit a cost estimate.

Seating myself by the open window in ng myself by the open window, in the balmy air of the bright June day, I caught up my pencil, and the words of the song were soon committed to paper, almost as they are being sung now.

Clean and scald the mussels; remove the meat; preserve the natural liquid. To I quart of meats, take 4 pound of salt pork, cut into small squares and fry to a brown. At the same time add 2 or 3 sliced onions and cook until the pork is thoroughly fried out; then add the mussle liquid., mixed with an equal quantity of water, and, when it comes to a boil, add a few finely chopped potatoes; then add the mussels, with I quart of hot milk.
