## Millions of Ties Will be Hauled On Coast Road

A deal involving \$2,000,000, covering a contract to supply railroad ties and split lumber, to be hauled over the Coast road from the Big Sur section, is reported to have been consummated.

Sam Trotter, a representative of the contractors, estimates that \$5000 will put the road in shape for hauling this immense quantity of material, and has made an offer to the Supervisors to pay 40 per cent of the cost. Therefore, the Board of Supervisors has made an order directing surveyor Cozzins to inspect the road and submit a cost estimate.

## Hymn Writer Dead

With the passing away of Fanny Crosby, at Bennington, Vermont, on January 3, there goes from life the last of the noted gospel hymn writers of the past half century.

From her fourteenth year, when her first bit of verse was published, she devoted a large part of her life to the production of poems and hymns. Of her hymns which came into common use, the best known is "I Need Thee Every Hour."

A short time before her death, speaking of her most famous composition, the author said:

"I remember well the morning, many years ago, when in the midst of the daily cares of my home, I was so filled with a sense of nearness to the Master that, wondering how one could live without Him, either in joy or pain, these words, I Need Thee Every Hour, were flashed into my mind. Seating myself by the open window, in the balmy air of the bright June day, I caught up my pencil, and the words of the song were soon committed to paper, almost as they are being sung now."

Among other hymns of which Miss Crosby was the author, are: "The Cross for Jesus," "Who'll Be the Next to Follow Jesus," "In the Valley," "Why Weepst Thou?" and "Good Night."

## Our Weekly Recipe

### Mussel Chowder

Clean and scald the mussels; remove the meat; preserve the natural liquid. To 1 quart of meats, take  $\frac{1}{4}$  pound of salt pork, cut into small squares and fry to a brown. At the same time add 2 or 3 sliced onions and cook until the pork is thoroughly fried out; then add the mussel liquid, mixed with an equal quantity of water, and, when it comes to a boil, add a few finely chopped potatoes; then add the mussels, with 1 quart of hot milk.
