

#### WEDDINGS ON SHORT NOTICE

#### How Missionaries in the Early Days Obtained Their Wives.

There is a touch of comedy about the businesslike way in which several of the early missionaries went to work to obtain wives before they left the shores of New England, writes the Rev. Franci, E. Clark in Youth's Com-panion. The call to go to Hawali was somewhat sudden and imperative. As a rule, only one vessel that would take passengers sailed in the course of a year for Honolulu, and of course it went by the way of Cape Horn. Often not more than a few days or weeks elapsed between the decision of the young theologian to accept the commission of the American board and the sailing of the packet ship. But the rule of the board was that the applicants must be married before they sailed for the field. Ay, there was the rub, for in many cases they had not decided whom to ask to be their brides.

But the time and tide would not wait for a long courtship, and so brothers or cousins or roommates were asked to intercede with eligible maldens, whom perhaps the prospective bridegrooms had never seen. It is even said that the young theologians haunted "female seminaries," and that the good, pretty and plous girls were lined up for their inspection.

Although this may be an exaggeration, it is certain that several of the brides who in the early days went with their missionary husbands to Hawali were wooed by proxy, at least during the preliminary stages of the wooing. It should be added that, so far as is known, all those marriages turned out most happily, both for the young couples and for the work in which they were engaged. Their high purpose, their commen sacrifice and their great mission in life drew them close together.




Here's an old fash oned recipe for corn mufilns that has recently been revived and used with unusual success in several of the larger New York hotels: To make three and a half dozen mufins take one quart milk, six ounces butter substitute, twelve ounces of light syrup or honey, four eggs, pinch of salt, two ounces baking powder, one and a half pounds cornneal and one and a half pounds rye flour. The butter and syrup should be thoroughly mixed; then add the eggs gradually. Pour in the milk and add the rye flour mixed with cornneal and baking pow der.





and correct municipal shortcomings and extravagances, it may be said of him that he is proud of the enemies he has made.


Mr. Reed is an ab'e public speaker, and Carmel folks who take the trip "over the hill" to the Presbyterian Church will be well repaid for their journey.
