ORDINANCE NO. 19
AN ORDINAN EE OF THE CITY OF CARMEL-BY-THE-SEA PRESCRIBING THE FORM AND manner of giving notice OF GENERAL AND SPECTAL MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS, IN THE CITY OF CARMEL-BY-THESEA, WHEN NOT OIHERWISE fIXED BY LAW, AND REPEAL ING ALL CONFLICIING ORDINANCES.
THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE CITY OF CARMEL-BY-THE. SEA DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:
Section 1-Notice of General and Special Munic pal Elections to be hereafter held in the City of Curmel-by-the-Sea, County of Munterey, State of Califorma, when not otherwise fixed by law, shall be given in the following manner:
Not less than thirty days preceding the day set for the holding of any General er Special Municipal Election in the said (iity of Carmel-by-the-Sea, the Board of 'Trustees of said City shall, by resolution to that end aciopted, require the City Clerk of said City to give notice of said election by porting copies of the notice hereinafter prescribed. - one on or near the door of the Council Chamber of said Board of Truste s. and one in each election orecinct at the place-de-ignated by the said Board in each election pricinct as the polling place for such precinct, and by causing a copy of such notice to be published in a newspaper published and circulat.d in said City of Carmèl-by-the-Sea.
The notice herein provided for must be posted and publi hed not less than twenty-five (25) days preceding the day set for such election. The publication to be by three insertions in a daily or weekly newspaper published and circulated in said city. The last publication to be at least one week before the day such election is to be held. Said notice shall contain

1. A statament of the time of the election and whether the same is a general or special election.
2. The place where and the hours during which the polls will be open.
3. A description of the voting precinets.
4. The names of the persons appointed to constitute the Boards of Election in the several precincts.
5. A statement of the municipa office or offices to be filled, if any.
6. A statement of any matter or proposition, if any, other than the election of officers, which is to be submitted to the voters of a municipality at such election.
Section 2.-All ordinances a $n d$ parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are herehy repealed.
Section 3. This Ordinance is declared to be urgent and necessary for the mantename of the form of government provided for by the City of Carmel-br-the-Sea, and therefore necessary for the immediate prcservation of th. public peace, health and safety, and shall take effect and be in full furce on and afterits final passage and adoption, and it is to be
