## Ginger Cake

The ingredients are: 1 cup of sugar, 1 tablespoon of lard, 1 cup of milk, 1 tablespoou of butter, $2 \frac{1}{2}$ cups of flous, 1 cup of molasses, 1 egg, 1 teaspoon of baking soda, teaspoon of ginger, 1 teaspoon of allspice. 1 teaspoon of cinuamon, ancia pineh of salt
Cream the lard and butter together and work the sugar into it. Put the soda into the molasses and beat it nutil it is light colored. Add this to the butter, lard and sugar and beat again; then add the egg, well beaten, then the milk, and last, the flour with which the salt and spices have been sifted. Bake in a moderate oven.
