Our Weekly Recipe

Ginger Cake

The ingredients are: 1 cup of sugar, 1 tablespoon of lard, 1 cup of milk, 1 tablespoon of butter, 2½ cups of flour, 1 cup of molasses, 1 egg, 1 teaspoon of baking soda, 1 teaspoon of ginger, 1 teaspoon of allspice, 1 teaspoon of cinnamon, and a pinch of salt.

Cream the lard and butter together and work the sugar into it. Put the soda into the molasses and beat it until it is light colored. Add this to the butter, lard and sugar and beat again; then add the egg, well beaten, then the milk, and last, the flour with which the salt and spices have been sifted. Bake in a moderate oven.

Passing of John Cogle

Another Carmel pioneer has gone to his reward. There are very few of the old-timers left. John Peter Cogle, aged 75, is no more. He had been ill but a day or two, during which time he was cared for by neighbors. He passed away peacefully on Monday morning, death being unexpected.

Old John Cogle was a true pioneer. He came to Carmel when it was a veritable jungle. There were no streets, no houses, no water. With the first-comers he helped to build the town. He erected a home for his wife and himself. He helped to lay out the streets, put down water pipes, and withal worked hard and acquired some property.

After the death of his wife, four years ago, he and his brother Harry lived together until about a year ago, when, because of failing eyesight and poor health, Harry went to Batavia, N. Y., to make his home with a sister.

Mr. Cogle was a veteran of the Civil War, having entered the Union army at the age of thirteen. He was a pensioner. His affairs were in the hands of attorney Fred A. Treat, but Hudson, Martin & Jorgensen will probably assume charge of the estate.

Friends, acquaintances, and Grand Army men attended the funeral yesterday afternoon, held from the Freeman Parlors. Interment was at Monterey Cemetery.
