Owing to the fact that Carmel's purchases of Third Liberty Loan bonds are listed as belonging to Monterey Peninsula district, Carmel does not appear in the list of towns which have been awarded the honor flags. Efforts are being made to have our quota established.

Last week's rally here has given a splendid impetus to the four-week drive, and up to last night nearly \$11,000 worth of the bonds had been purchased by Carmel residents.

A patriotic crowd greeted the speakers at the Manzanita Theatre last Friday night. Led by the school children, the audience entered heartily into the spirit and the purpose for which they had gathered; i.e. the promotion and sale of Third Liberty Loan bonds.

Put them into circula-tion. If you need the money their purchase represents, sell them, pay a bill with them. They have the same legal tender value as a government 'greenback.'" 

WHEATLESS RECIPES

- Hominy Bread 1 cup cold boiled hominy
- 11/2 cups milk
- 1 cup corn meal

1/2 teaspoon salt

1 teaspoon baking powder 1 egg

1 tablespoon fat

Put the hominy into a bowl and beat it thoroughly with a fork. Pour the milk gradually over the hominy and continue beating. Mix and sift the corn meal, salt and baking powder and add them, with the egg well beaten and the melted fat, to the hominy Bake the mixture in a deep, greased baking dish for thirty minutes, or for fifteen minutes in muffin tins.

WHEATLESS PIE CRUST—No. 1 $1_{1/2}$ cups rye flour $1_{1/2}$ cups barley flour

- % cup rice flour 1 teaspoon salt 1 teaspcon baking powder

3/4 cup fat

- % cup water BARLEY PONE WITH CORN MEAL 1/2 cup barley
 - cup corn meal 1 tablespoon vegetable oil or
 - oleomargarine 2 tablespoons molasses
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 4 teaspoons baking powder

Wash the barley and boil slowly in 4 cups of boiling water for one hour While hot, add the corn meal slowly stirring very hard so the meal will not lump. Add the molasses and salt: mix well; when cooled add the bak ing powder; put into two well-greased. medium-sized pie tins. Bake for from thirty to forty minutes, or until nice and brown. 
