While the monthly bills were being read, Trustee Kibbler exprensed the opinion that the office of city attorney was unnec-ssary, but his motion to dispense with the services of that official wits lost. Those who voted agaiust the proposal lused their opposition upon the ground that there would be no economy in engaging the services of a lawyer every time legal services were required.
Trustae Arne's suggestion that the marshal do work other than police work was takeu uuder s.dvisement.

There was considerable discussion regarding street work, particular emphasis being laid upon the uecessity of tomy something on Ocman avenue. Mr. Kibbler is to obtain from a Montorey street contractor approximate figures per lot for clay streets, said figures to vary from $\$ 15$ to $\$ 20$.
A building permit ordinance was given its first reading.
Bills aggregating $\$ 398.66$ were presented and approved.

## Authority on <br> Russian Affairs Now Here

Today when we are talking of "Runaway Russia" it is most in. ter-sting to find some one who is ca pable of answering our questions. Camping on the river bank with his artist wife is Alexander $S$. Kaun of the University of California. He was born in Ukraiue and knows the Rusaian not only analytically, but with a fino sympathy.
Mr. Kaun will give a course in Russian literature at ths summer school in Berkeley, and while he is vacationing hare be is mutertaining his frieuds "who want to know all about the Bolshevik."
"Bolshevism never really repre sented Russia, it was no more essential Russia than antocracy,' said Mr. Kaum and added that the present chaotic condition was due to the fact that the Russians have studied republican methods of goverument and found them imperfect. Asked if Russian itleais are mocialistic be said he should cousider state socialism as opposed tu the Russian mind.

One thing he is thoroughly com. vinced of - that in spite of Russia making peace terms with the kai ser she will never allow her coun Iry to be dominated by the germans. He considers the deposect Kerensky the highest exprension of Russian idralism.
