On account of the needs of the catmen the citrus and deciduous fruit wers are urged for this year to abfrom the use of bean straw and alfa as fertilizer or mulch. The catmen on the other hand are as strongurged to conserve every possible ad of manure for the use of the growers in lieu of the straw usutaken by them.



Under U. S. Govern-ment Supervision

Authority on Russian Affairs Now Here

Today when we are talking of "Runaway Russia" it is most inter-sting to find some one who is capable of answering our questions.

Camping on the river bank with his artist wife is Alexander S. Kaun of the University of California. He was born in Ukraine and knows the Russian not only analy-

tically, but with a fine sympathy.

Mr. Kaun will give a course in
Russian literature at the summer school in Berkeley, and while he is vacationing here he is entertaining his friends "who want to know all about the Bolshevik."
"Bolshevism never really repre-

sented Russia, it was no more es-sential Russia than autocracy," said Mr. Kaun and added that the present chaotic condition was due to the fact that the Russians have studied republican methods of government and found them imperfect. Asked if Russian idea, s are socialistic he said he should consider state socialism as opposed tu the Russian mind.

One thing he is thoroughly convinced of—that in spite of Russia making peace terms with the kaiser she will never allow her cour try to be dominated by the ger-mans. He considers the deposed Kerensky the highest expression of Russian idealism.
