# OFFICIAL FOOD NEWS

Issued by  
U. S. Food Administration  
for California

Reports and rumors which have been widely circulated in California to the effect that there is no further need for wheat conservation, were declared false today by Federal Food Commissioner Ralph P. Merritt, who said such propaganda evidently originated from pro-German or other sources inimical to the government's interests.

"While California has responded to the country's appeal for wheat saving as a most generous measure, allowing to assemble nearly 300,000 barrels of flour for export to our armies and the armies and civilian populations of the Allies, further conservation is absolutely necessary to carry us through the next harvest," Merritt said.

Herbert C. Hoover's attention was called to these erroneous reports circulated here and in other states and a telegram today to Merritt he said "the nation must cut its consumption of wheat flour and wheat products one-third of normal for the next three months to allow us to fulfill the requirements of the Allies."

With the present adequate supplies of fresh vegetables, dairy products, and fruit season almost here, Merritt said, and the fact that California has asked to reduce meat consumption very little, "wheat can and should be largely eliminated from the diet of all except those of the classes engaged in hard manual labor."

**When the Movie Actors Nearly Froze**

Memories of their last winter's trip to Maine to obtain background for "Broadway Bill," a Harold Lockwood production, were recalled to visiting members of the Yorke Metro motion picture company by the Pine Cone's observation of the departure from Carmel of Harry Leon Wilson for the wilds of Maine where he will collaborate with Booth Tarkington in the production of a big literary effort.

Perhaps the one thing that stands out most vividly to the visiting motion picture players when their Maine trip is recalled is the severity of the Northeastern winters. The Yorke Metro company was located at Dead River, a remote locality, for about four weeks in the months of December and January. When the aggregation arrived at its destination the thermometer registered ten degrees below zero and one of them ventured to remark to one of the drivers of the fleet of sleighs which met the company at the station, that the weather was as cold as the proverbial blue blazes. To this observation the native driver prophesied: "Cold? This aint nothing You ain't seen no cold, yit."

And he spoke the truth. From the first day on the mercury in the thermometer began to drop until it reached the point of forty-eight below zero. The players worked out in the open all day long in spite of the bitter cold, and at night they repaired to their cabins—cabins they were called, but they were frail structures built to accommodate summer hunting parties and not to house winter visitors—and huddled around the stove to keep warm. During the night the fires would go out and in anticipation of the consequently heightened cold the visitors added numerous pieces from their wardrobe to the allotted bed covering. In the morning the water receptacles were surfaced with ice, which had to be cracked before the usual morning duties could be performed. Such is winter in the wilds of Maine.

No wonder people from all over the country seek Carmel and other California points for the winter!
