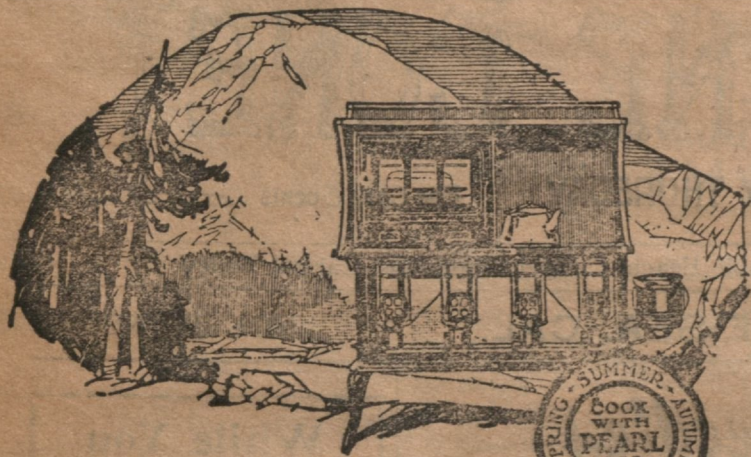

Survey Work on Coast Road Progressing Rapidly

Work on the surveys for the extension of the coast highway from Carmel-by-the-Sea to San Simeon in San Luis Obispo county is progressing satisfactorily under the direction of Engineer Howe of the state highway commission. The survey for the lateral from Jolon to the ocean is already finished. The grades are not as steep as was expected, the heaviest between the two points being six per cent.

No prohibitory grades have been encountered and the cost of the road will not be as much as the preliminary estimates. San Luis Obispo county will do its share of construction to the Monterey County line and the Department of the Interior will see that the work is done through the forest reserve lands.

Senator E. S. Rigdon and Assemblyman W. J. Martin will devote their efforts at the 1919 session of the legislature to secure an appropriation for the completion of this highway, which will open up a virgin territory and make accessible some of the most picturesque scenery in the world. The road will also be of great military value.

Red Cross Notes

On that famous Thursday when it became evident that Foch was beginning to push the Germans back, the American Red Cross sent seven tons of surgical dressings and five tons of special diet foods to the principal evacuation hospitals of the American army.

Red Cross work grows in Britain. The King has given land in Richmond Park for a hospital. The grounds of Windsor Castle were offered but not accepted, owing to difficulty of drainage.

Hospital work is only one side of American Red Cross activities. The doctors in their rounds are followed by nurses with postcards and fountain pens, so that every wounded American soldier has an opportunity to tell the folks at home "we're all right." Surely, we cannot do less than to reply in kind.

Twenty-one American Red Cross ambulance drivers have been awarded the Italian cross of war for bravery during the Austrian offensive.

The matter of enough men to supply partners for ladies was very well solved at last Thursday's Red Cross dance by the attendance of a considerable number of soldier boys from the Monterey Presidio. Everybody had a good time, and for this those in charge have a big credit mark coming. Especially Miss E. A. McLean worked hard and unceasingly. As previously, the ball and music were donated.

Ocean Avenue May Be Paved

Aside from the surveys already made, the most important action of the City Trustees yet taken concerning street work, occurred at Tuesday evening's monthly meeting, with the adoption of Trustee Kibbler's motion to have the City Clerk communicate with Ocean Avenue property owners to the effect that a substantial temporary 24-foot clay roadway, plowed rolled and watered, six inches deep, could be laid on that street for approximately 60 cents to 70 cents a foot. This plan would be the basis of a more substantial street in the future.

All the Trustees were on hand, and a number of citizens were in attendance. Dr. C. A. McCollom addressed the Board concerning a plan to have this community honor its men in the military and naval service, by a display of their names. The Board endorsed the project, and passed a motion authorizing Chairman Fraser to appoint a committee of citizens to carry out the plan by public subscription.

Trustee Arne, Commissioner of Fire and Police, was authorized to make such alterations and to purchase such equipment as will enhance the efficiency of the fire department.

The electric light near the bath house, heretofore privately maintained, will now be paid for by the city.

Next Monday morning, August 12, the Trustees will meet as a board of equalization, and in the evening of the same day will meet to consider the application of C. W. Bowen to conduct a stage line.
