# Survey Work on Coast <br> Road Progressing Rapidly 

Work on the surveys for the extension of the coast highway from Carmel-by-the-Sea to San Simeon in San Luis Obispo county is progressing satisfactorily under the direction of Engineer Howe of the state highway commission. The survey for the lateral from Jolon to the ocean is already finished. The grades are not as steep as was expected, the heaviest between the two points being six per cent.

No prohibitory grades have been encountered and the cost of the road will not be as much as the preliminary estimates. San Luis Obispo county will do its share of construction to the Monterey County line and the Department of the Interior will see that the work is done through the forest reserve lands. -6
Senator E. S. Rigdon and Assemblyman, W. J. Martin will devote their efforts at the 1919 session of the legisature to secure an appropriation for the completion of this highway, which will open up a virgin territory and make accessible some of the most picturesque scenery in the world. The road will also be of great military value.
