# Some Experiences of a New " $Y$ " Man in France 

Perry Newberry Writes Interesting Account of His Work and Observations

## THIRD ARTICLE

## September 1, 1918

There is still war in France, for all around me pop the big guns, overhead buzz the Jerry-planes, and the mules kick along the picket line. Also it hailed to day and we all got wet. Also we had roast beef, boiled potatoes, cabbage, carrots, stewed apricots, bread and coffee for dinner No: a particularly good dinner either, as dimers go in the 304th F. E. We live pretty high, believe me; and every day or two I yank in chocolate, cookies, jellies, jams, cigarettes, gum, cigars, etc., from the Y. M. C. A., and the boys certainly have no kick on the food question.

Be-cootied they are-and dirty. Not a chance for a bath or a change of underwear for months - and officers and men scratch and curse their dirtiness. I haven't had my elothes off since I joined the army, but I have not seen or felt a cootie yet.

Believe me, I have to work. To obtain supplies I have to go twelve miles, sometimes afoot, sometimes on horseback, more often in an autotruck. I've been lost several times and wandered miles out of my way. Day before yesterday, while on horseback, a Boche airplane flew low up the road and machinegunned a line of infantry as I was passing. The infantry took cover in the ditch beside the road, while I galloped under the plane. I do not know how many the Boch landed.

When I get my supplies in, I apportion them out to the different batteries and companies, make up the boxes and see that they get into the proper men's hands for distribution. A large proportion goes up to the batteries, to the men on the guns, and I have to see that the boxes and sacks get on the ration wagons. I have an assistant, Private Brown, who was a school teacher in Brooklyn, and he is a dandy at this ga ne. I have been able to get the boys two and three distributions a week, which is about ten times as much as they had before, so I stand well with them

There is a great deal of rain, and $r$ ain is worse than shrapnel and almost as bad as gas to the men at the front A slrelter-tent, thirty inches high aad ix feet square, for two men, is far from being commodious and they do not shed rain worth me..tioning I am wet a great deal of the time, damp all the time, and cold some of the time But, homestly, I enjoy it and will be sorry if the continued rumors of peace are true I wait enough more actual war to help drop shells into German cities and watch them crumble into du $t$ and ashes like
some of the French towns I have passed thru. We at the front want no German peace, and we are willing to fight in wet and cold until we get our peace- a righteous retributive peace. The Huns have never played fairly at war as individuals or colleetively, and this peace they seek is as unfair as their methods of warfare. We must gain our own kind of peace.

It is morning again, a cold raw misty morning. I have started a camp fire in front of my sheltertent

I : ave dispatched a sergeant on horseback on a twelve-mile jaunt to the rail-head tor newspapers. There is a barrage being laid down on our front which sounds like a continuous roll of drums, no shot being distinct in the enormous mass of sho:s. I have had my breakfast ba $3 \ldots$, pork and beans and coffee an seraped the mud off my boots. I have been down to the captain's camp fire and passed the time 'o day with the company officers, earning that we will move this echelon this afternoon or perhaps to-
morrow morning Our guns moved ahead twelve kilometers last night, driving the Germans out of the woods. The enemy is on the run. Only his long range guns reach us now. Not a dozen shells fell in our neck of the woods last night, they tell me. I hadn't known of any, for I slept all night.

Well, moving the echelon means tearing down my tent, packing my boxes and roll-up, riding a day or a night with Bill Hawkins, and making a new camp in the mud. Very well. So be it. War is hell.

## Grain Saved by <br> Clean Threshing

In thirty-three states where cam paigns toward cleaner harvesting and cleaning have been conducted, mors than $16,000,000$ bushels of wheat Las been saved, according to reports made public today by the Urited States Food Administration for California. Tuls saving represents wheat cargoes of 30,000 brishels each for 500 food ships. and will materially aid America to save and export the $17,500,000$ tons of food stuffs pledged prior to Jume 30 , next.
Many other states where the foot administration's so-called "blanises test" has shown growers how to decer mine when a threshing machine is ex tracting the grain properly, have re ported greatly reduced harvest losses, and other methods of farm conserva tion have resulted in further saving: of marketable grain.
Under agreement of the food admir istration with the food con'rollers of the Allied nations, our breadztafts e: port program for the coming year will aggregate $409,320,000$ bushels, which is equivalent to more than 60 bishels 0 every farm in the Cnited States. this total between $100,000,000$ and 165 . 000,000 bushels will be rye, barley and nontm
