PEACE PRCGRMMCALLS FOR NCTEEASEDSAVITIA

Starving Millions Now Look to America's Open Pantry for Sustenance.

America's intensive food conservation program must not cease in order that we may continue our world leadership along humanitarian lines and serve all starving and demoralized peoples, not only of neutral countries. but the liberated peoples of those goveinments which no longer threaten the peace of the world, according to advices recelved from Food Administration officials at Washington.

Food has become the greatest "unarmed policeman" ever known. It is vitally necessary to eqve blondy ansr. chy from over-ruming a large portion of Europe. It $\mathrm{i}=\mathrm{t}$ a tennquilizo. the one thing that w:lll meke it possible for peace and reconstruction te prevail among theze nations which have fought and ble for more than four years while cmlucting the most awful war human'ly has ever known.

America has
we the food reser-
Starving millions voir of the world. Starving millions
look to us for sustenance, and we are pledged to send it. More than 200, $000,0 ¢ 0$ people additional have been added to those to whom we agreed to send approximately $17,500,000$ tons of food stuffs this year. Peace, now in. dicated by the signing of the armil. stiee with Germany, as a possibility of the very near future, has not added one pound of food to the world's resources and no further crops in those stricken countries are possible until next spring and summer.

Our last year's food shipments aggregated about 11. 20.000 tons. Our war program called for the exportation of $17,500.000$ tens nrior to June 30 next, while our pace program calls for nearly 20.000 .000 tons. By com-
paring this vast amount with our averparing this vast amount with our aver000,000 thens it conent of less than to fulfill our pledze to aid literally millions of starving women and children, on whom America never made war, will mean greatly increased production, accomnanied by intensive food saying all down the line; the absolute elimination of waste and extravagance in the kitchens and on the tables of the homes, and the substitntion of home-grown products and perishables as much as possible for those staples which can be readily exported.

Saving from now on should chiefly be directed to fats of all kinds, dairy products, which include cheese and butter; meats, sugar and all other staple commodities. None is asked to sacrifice health or happiness in this new program of saving, but merely to exercise thought and gare in the preparation and use of foods which can be exported to the famished people of Europe, who look to us for their salvation and relief from hunger and distress.

While the war is over, the need for conservation remains in order that the American pebple may take their place as the "Big Brother" of the oppressed and the suffering, and the Government confldently expects that the new appeal to the humanitarian feelings of the nation will be as e:fective as was the food appeal based on the slogan, "Save Food to Win the War."

## A BOX FROM HOME



Food savings of millions of Americans during our first year of war enabled thit ment to send enormous food shipments abroad for our fighting forces and the Allid Our savings in cereals-out of a short crop-amounted to $154,500,000$ bushels; all of " shipped to Europe. We increased our meat and fat shipments $844,600,000$ pounds. America's "box from home" to our army abroad and the civilians and military forc Allied nations.

## Great Tibetan Industry.

By far the largest herds of musk deer are to be found on the southern shores of the Koko-Nor, and the supply of musk there (at T"aochou) is larger than the quantity that comes through Sungpan. In fact, great quantities of musk do not come to Sungpan at all, but are sent east to Yuchow, in Honan, where a fair is held in the ninth and tenth moons, many of the Sungnan traders visiting this place. At Tachi+nlu musk is the mest valuable export, practically every hong reeking with it, anil menrly all the Tibetans who crme from the far interior bring some with them. The price of miedlum musk there is thirteen times its welght in sllver.

## Shark Leather Here.

From being an implacable enemy to man science is making the shark expiate its crimes by helping to reduce the high cost of living. For the tiger of the sea has now become a source ot leather to cothe millions of pairs of feet.

Experiments with shark leather indieate that it may be used for practically everything now made of cattle leather. It is even claimed that shark hides have one great advantage over cowhides in that the "spilits" are amazingly strong. A "split" is straply a peeling of the lide-something like the veneer cut from a slab of wood.

Interesting Life Statistics.
On the authority of experts representing forty-three lending: life insurance companies in the United States, it appears that a spinstec lives longer than a married woman. Business womtil live longer than business men. A womun who takes an endowment poticy lives longer than a woman who takes an ordinary life policy. It is not easy to explain why an utumarried woman survives a matron, nor why a business woman survives a business man, but the longevity of the endowinent woman is belleved to be due to the determination to live until the policy matures.
