The Home Service Department of the American Red Cross is working with the district officers of the Federal Board of Vocational Education in the interest of disabled soldiers. Home Service Sections in the Pacific Division are lending valuable aid to the men and their families by maintaining the morale of the family and sustaining the man's purpose to take vocational training: by helping to persuade the man and his family of the value of such training, and, in special instances, by supervising the handling of cases not yet eligible for vocational training, but which may become so

The financial report of the American Red Cross for the year ending June 30, 1918, has been received from Washington. It presents a detailed statement of finances practically from the beginning of our entrance into the war. A statement will be issued as soon as it can be compiled bringing the figures up to January 1, this year, and covering the whole period of active hostilities. It has been the policy of the War Council to conduct the finances as an open book; there are no secrets; all details as to salaries, contracts, etc., are open to public scrutiny
